A lady in town who was asked the other day why they didn't take the Graphic replied that it pandered too much to the saloons! This will come as a rib tickler to any one with a vestige of a sense of humor. The joke is worth more than the price of the subscription. And at the same time we've made a discovery—there's one non-subscriber in town who doesn't read the neighbor's paper.

The Graphic has had little sympathy for yellow journalism but candor compels us to acknowledge the justice of the following observation made by the Albany Democrat: It is a peculiar fact that a good many so-called yellow journals come nearer being on the right side of some of the leading questions of the day than some of the sober, staid sheets, with long faces. About the only papers that dare present editorials in favor of temperance are the Hearst journals, generally supposed to be yellow.

It is with more or less amusement that many who were unable to get to Chicago in 1893 reflect that they resigned themselves to fate with the thought that their one opportunity for seeing a world's fair had been lost. To say nothing of the many expositions which have been held since that time, three are already projected for the near future. Seattle aspires to hold one in 1907, the fortieth anniversary of the acquirement of Alaska. Arrangements are already under way for the Jamestown exposition, which will cele-

brate the four hundredth anniversary of the founding of the first permanent English settlement on the American continent. And New York wishes in 1909 thus to commemorate the three hundredth anniversary of the discover of the Hudson river. As long as the anniversaries hold out we are good for world's fairs.

In a timely editorial on "The One Thing Needful," the Telephone Register says: "The one essential of success that is more or less lacking in this county is the willingness to devote time and money to enterprises of a public nature. Our people are not lacking in energy and ambition, but somehow the great majority seem imbued with the idea that their whole time and attention must be devoted to their private affairs and for this reason it is difficult to get the average citizen interested in the public welfare." In other words Yamhill needs more of the "Watch Tacoma Grow" spirit.

The citizens of Forest Grove, a good temperance town, backslid and elected a license council. The courts then decided that according to the city charter the council could not license a saloon. As a result three saloons are running night and day and pay not a cent of revenue. The temperance people are deploring the reputation the town is getting and the license people are disgusted that the city treasury is receiving no revenue with which to keep up sidewalks. The saloon keepers alone seem to be well satisfied. Moral—the people of the university town should have let well enough alone.

It is particularly unfortunate that of all years, Newberg presents a comparatively uninviting appearance this summer. Home owners were going to have their lawns up in good shape with the luxuriant roses all abloom—and a lack of water has turned the lawns from green to brown and the roses droop and shatter. And to make matters worse the streets are full of gravel wagons and a cloud of dust envelops the town. It's unfortunate but not discouraging. Tell the visitors that we'll have plenty of water some of these days and that the dust means good streets for Newberg. Keep cheerful. The inconvenience is temporary only.

- Twofold markets, consisting of the Eastern states and of the extreme Orient, thus doubling both the sources of income and guarding against the effects of panics and commercial depression.
- Matchless scenic attractions, guaranteeing an ever-increasing tourist revenue.—August Pacific Monthly.
