At Their Journey's End.

Ethel Taylor McKillop Registers First Impressions of the Philippines in a Series of Interesting Sketches.

Lucena, Tayabas, P. I. June 18—Our first Sunday in Lucena! Not much like Sunday either as there is no Protestant church this side of Manila that we know of. Catholicism everywhere here but we shall steer clear of it and try not to lose our hold on things.

Last Wednesday morning we went on board the Borangdon at Manila and amid a steady downpour of rain waited until four o'clock for her to start. At that hour we were off and on our way to our future home. Mr. Balch, the principal of the school here, and one other gentleman, were the only passengers beside ourselves. I was the only woman on board. It was a clean little boat much like our river steamers. The captain was a Spaniard and did not understand English so we could not talk much. The sea was choppy but it did not effect as good sailors as we.

The next morning we were at the landing off Lucena. We had to go ashore in a little row-boat, a trip of about a mile and a half

up a beautiful river bounded by groves of cocoa-nut palms—a truly tropical scene. At the landing we got into a carromata and came for about a mile up a fine road and were in Lucena. We went to Mr. Wardell's home and found him ready for us. We also met Mr. and Mrs. Nelson. Mr. Nelson is post-master and Mrs. Nelson teaches. They are very nice people and have been exceedingly kind to us. Mr. Nelson puts in his spare time in culture of flowers. He has ever so many varieties of roses and carnations. It seemed quite homelike among them, only the blossoms are very small here on account of the heat. It is much cooler here than in Manila.

The school house is made of nipa (a grass) and is very pleasant. The pupils are very cleanly and studious. I am to teach Physiology, Geography, Philippine History, and Philippine Civics besides giving lectures on Cooking, Domestic Science, etc. Jamie has more Literature and Mathematics. There are four other white teachers and several Filipino teachers.

We rented the upstairs of an old Spanish house for forty-five pesos a month (22½ dollars). That is considered a fair price here. We also have a muchacho (a boy) who keeps the house neat and runs errands, etc. for his "chow" (food) and washing. He is one of the school boys. We are boarding at present because we have not yet found a cook. Our principal objection is the poor water. We thought last night we would be willing to pay a big price for a good drink. Everything is new to us yet as we have been here such a short time. I like the school and school work very much and I shall soon get used to other things.

We get mail twice a week from

Manila so we are fortunate in that respect.

July 2—The rainy season is here in all its dampness. We have had a steady downpour since yesterday morning. It is much cooler when it is raining. The temperature is rarely above 98° here at any time of year and usually it is about 85° but the tropical sun is very oppressive to those of the white race.

Well we are pretty well at home now and things are not so bad as they seemed at first. We are paying a frightful price for our house but it is the best we could do. We have a large study and a bedroom furnished. The "muchacho", Vicenti, has a little room and we are not using the rest of the house. We have decided not to get a cook but to board as it is much cheaper and less trouble. We pay \$20 a month apiece for board that is plentiful and good as can be had in the place. We have chicken, fish, crabs, shrimps, etc., but no butter, or cream or fruit except the raw bananas and mangos.

They have two little pigs, two kittens and a pet rooster running about their kitchen and three big dogs in the dining room but one does not mind such things in the Philippines. The horse is usually in the hall of the house and we have to shove him over to go upstairs to the dining room. You and Douglas would have to leave your "niceties" behind you or you would starve here. Mr. Wardell, the acting superintendent of the province, and Mr. Balch, the high school principal, board at Mr. Corro's with us.

There are three languages spoken here, Spanish, English and Tagalog. Mr. Corro is a Spaniard who has married a Filipino, so we have three languages spoken at table. English is the only language spoken in school but out of school the pupils all use Tagalog. They do not understand Spanish. They sometimes are very hard to understand as they speak broken English.

Day after tomorrow is July 4 but we will not celebrate except by closing school. Lucena people are saving all their work and money to have a glorious celebration for Taft and Miss Roosevelt. They are coming to Lucena after Manila.

We enjoy getting our papers very much more than we ever did in the States. I did not write those letters for publication and so was not very careful about my wording.

I suppose the Fair is in full swing now. I wish I might see it but that may not be.
