memory of Lewis and Clark.

Clark exposition while the live  
stock exhibit is being held ad-

monishes Editor Williamson. It  
will be the finest collection of  
good stock ever brought to-  
gether on the Pacific Coast. In-  
telligent interest in pure-bred  
stock is everywhere a character-  
istic of the best and most pro-  
gressive farming communities.  
Give the young people of the  
farm a chance, also, to see this  
stock. There is no better way  
to keep the ambitious and intel-  
ligent young man on the farm  
than by getting him interested  
in breeding pure-bred stock of  
some kind.

The editor of the Oregon Agri-  
culturalist, one of the best known  
and most reliable publications  
of its class on the coast, in men-  
tioning the death of W. K. Allen,  
which took place here recently,  
pays him the following, well-  
deserved tribute: "Mr. Allen  
did much for the prune industry  
in the Northwest, and built up a  
large business in the face of great  
obstacles. He took a deep in-  
terest in his work and was as  
anxious to learn the best methods  
of evaporating and curing prunes  
as he was to make his business  
pay. It is also to be said to his  
credit that he kept no trade  
secrets to himself in the prune  
curing business. He cheerfully  
made public all that he learned  
and was sincerely desirous of  
helping others to do as well as  
he could himself do."

With all the unfavorable com-  
ment made on the different coun-  
ty exhibits at the fair, particu-  
larly as to the horticultural dis-  
play, the situation is very plainly  
and fairly stated thus by an ex-  
change. "There is no use in ex-  
pecting as fine all-around dis-  
plays of fruits and vegetables at  
the Lewis and Clark exposition  
as could have been made in more  
favorable years. Both last year  
and this have been unfavorable  
for the production of show speci-  
mens in large portions of the  
Pacific Northwest. In view of  
this fact it is simple justice to  
those in charge of the state and  
county exhibits to say that on  
the whole they are doing re-  
markably well. There have been  
and are yet some specimens of  
fruit at some of the county ex-  
hibits which ought never to have  
been shown, but it is surprising  
how many fine specimens are  
sent in from so many different  
localities."

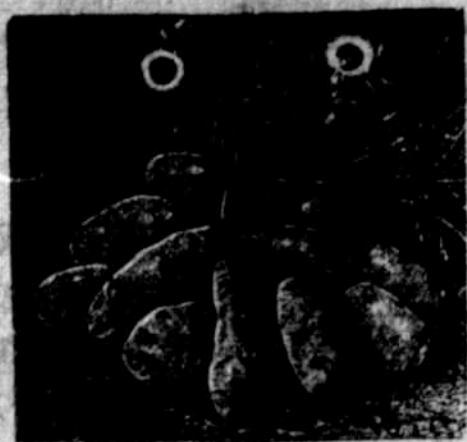
