In bragging about what McMinnville business men were going to do for the county exhibit, a county seat paper made the insinuating suggestion a few weeks ago that they weren't boasting of doing it all like a certain town not one thousand miles away. The Graphic made no rejoinder at the time but concluded to wait for results, hoping to see exhibits rolling in from the hub. But as the fair nears its close, we trust our friends up the line won't think us impertinent for raising an inquiry as to the result of that stupendous activity among McMinnville business men. If it is possible that their exhibits have been lost in transit, wouldn't it be well to send out a tracer? At any rate we like their consideration in not claiming to furnish the whole show at the fair. Such magnanimity was really unexpected.

The Graphic wishes to encourage owners of farms in the neighborhood to give their farm homes suggestive names. It adds a little of sentiment or romance or dignity to country life and while the prosaic record of duties to be done is not lessened, an appropriate name lends attractiveness to home. Some farm homes in this vicinity have already been named. There are the mountainside Bonny View farm of Howard Walton, Spring Hill Farm of Atkinson Bros., Far View, the Chealem mountain home of P. N. Skinner, Lone Fir Farm of E. S. Craven, The Oaks, the home of David Martin, and Wildwood, the name of the Sears place west of town. And there may be more. All are pleasantly suggestive. Let others follow suit.

Tuesday's Oregonian presents an editorial upon "The Illicit Pulpit," relative to sensationalism in the pulpit, which is worthy the strongest commendation. It pierces the armor of the preacher who justifies his racy so-called sermons on the ground that he must draw a crowd, and shows up his betrayal of the great cause of true religion. The editorial is timely. The commercialization of the pulpit, the rivalry in the effort to be popular and draw the crowd, has lowered the standard and the true message is often overshadowed by material influences. More heinous blasphemy than the efforts of a sensational preacher can scarcely be imagined.

Senator Fulton hid himself off to Washington a few days ago when it was given out by the wise ones that the federal judge for Oregon would be appointed at last and that the vacancies in the Roseburg land office would be filled. But no sooner does the senator present the case of his candidates before the president than a further delay is announced. Dear, dear! What can the matter be?

The local Board of Trade got busy and furnished fine apples, pears and grapes for distribution to visitors while McMinnville—well a letter brim full of regrets found its way to the county exhibit. The spirit of the Harriman banquet, given in Portland some weeks ago, as compared with the ovation given Hill Monday night in the metropolis, is indicative of the different manner in

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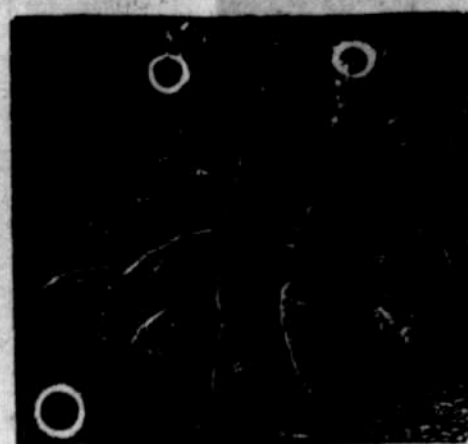
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
