## ACTIVITY OF THE GULF STREAM



That the gulf stream is active six hundred miles east of New York city, a point in the Atlantic Ocean, where, according to the best authorities, it should be hardly discernible and with such a flow as to hold back a tremendous extent the winds on her western way, was asserted by Captain Ruser, of that ship, when she arrived at Hoboken from Hamburg, Boulogne and Dover.

Captain Ruser said that never before in his many trips across the western ocean had he observed the gulf stream so active, and the temperature recorded was almost phenomenal. The Melita had fine weather all the way, and the engines were driving her at a seventeen-knot gait, when the gulf stream was encountered. For two days before this the ship had dropped in her speed in an almost unexplainable manner. On Monday the runlog reckoning showed 401 knots; the next day 387, the next 383 and 382 on the following days, and Captain Ruser began to seek for the cause. The water suddenly began to grow warmer, and in streaks, or, as the captain said, "like fingers," and there were high temperature readings starting.

Coming out of water flowing from 12 and 15 degrees Fahrenheit, the thermometer registered 56 degrees. At this time the ship fell in in her speed fully a knot and a half an hour, and still was in the tropics.

For five hours, a distance of nearly eighty miles, this high temperature was recorded, and all day the peculiar activity of the gulf stream was apparent. When the day's run was completed it was found that the ship had logged only 347 miles.

**ANCIENT FURNITURE.**

The Couch was Most Important in  
House of Apartments  
The couch was one of the most im-  
portant pieces of furniture in the  
houses of the people of ancient Egypt.  
It was used at meal times; for reclining  
upon, as well as at night for a bed.  
Probably the earliest mention of the  
couch is to be found in II. Kings, iv.  
Chapter, of the Old Testament, when  
Elisha visited the Shunammite about  
905 B. C., and we are told of the  
preparations for the reception of the  
prophet, "Let us make a little cham-  
ber, I pray thee, on the wall, and let  
us set for him there a bed, and a  
table, and a stool, and a candlestick."  
And another incident is about 620  
years later, in the book of Esther,  
when upon ascending to the grandeur  
of the palace of Ahasuerus, we are  
enabled to catch a glimpse of Eastern  
magnificence in the description of the  
point of the garden of the king's pa-  
lace, "where were white, green, and  
blue hangings, fastened with cords of  
fine linen, and purple, and silver, and

from the Egyptians came changes and elaborations of the old forms. The furniture and utensils of the early Grecian house could not compare with that of modern times in completeness and variety, yet they were by no means wanting in design and construction. Couches were often richly decorated and frequently were cast of bronze or made of wood and inlaid with ivory and silver; the feet were usually formed of bold designs and the proportions ending distally in knobs or paws. Figures of men and animals frequently appear in these decorations. Especially rich and ornamental were the chairs and couches, the former being used by the women and the latter by the men, who loved to recline, write and take their meals in the same position before them in a sitting position.

The couch, which in earlier times was used chiefly by the men, had instead a kind of bench, either raised at a back or raised at the footboard being not so common. The footboard was here and over it and under it were laid over a kind of cushion, free after wind superimposed of cushions filled with feathers, were of various kinds, rough or smooth, heavy or light, sometimes woven in colored stripes or embroidered with gold or silver and trimmed with fringe and tassels, and a similar drapery often surrounded the lower part of the couch and concealed the feet. They were placed on the couch for reclining as well as for the bed, which was elevated from the floor in a variety of ways and styles of height.

Early reference to Greek furniture is made in Homer and Hesiod, both of whom

 centuries before the period which we  
 recognize as the guardian of Greek  
 art. The bedding was never kept in  
 large presses of closets, but in chests  
 of the same form as the caskets for  
 cosmetics and jewelry. With the trans-  
 mation of the Roman empire, when  
 was founded 750 B. C. came the  
 fourth great empire of antiquity. For  
 want of an artistic style of their own  
 they were dependent at first upon the  
 Greeks; but instead of following the  
 simplicity of that style they exag-  
 gerated the decorative treatment in  
 accordance with their love for splen-  
 dor. Their beds were made with ex-  
 traordinary beauty and comfort.  
 They had mattresses stuffed with  
 swansdown, wooden blankets and rich-  
 ly embroidered sheets. After the fall  
 of Rome beds and all other articles of  
 furniture refused to the most satis-  
 fying forms, the household goods of the  
 masses consisting of nothing but a  
 bench, a chest and a few skins. The  
 chest was used as a table by day  
 and with the skins thrown over it as  
 a bed by night. About the eleventh  
 century furniture became more ad-  
 vanced and the people of the north  
 and west began to build, at the  
 corner of houses, in the walls of  
 their houses and seats of fresh straw  
 were laid on a bench or raised board  
 and cushions were then to cover the  
 same from the rooms. Goat and bear  
 skins were then used as coverlets.
