**Circumstances Alter Cases.**

Dr. H. D. Bowers was recently asked again "Do you give examinations for nothing?" Yes, when the patient takes treatment. Osteopaths everywhere charge three dollars (\$3) for examination when nothing else is wanted. It is often of inestimable value to the invalid to get an examination and the doctor's opinion and his prospects of cure from the conditions found. To be called away from the office to the home is the greater reason for charging. Osteopaths spend three years of their time and hundreds of dollars in learning their profession. And their knowledge is of special value to the sick. There is as much reason for them to charge as there is for the M. D.'s to charge for making a visit. And you can put the visits in your eye that they make gratis—and no one has a right to criticize them for it either. They spend their time and money in acquiring their education.

Osteopaths spend nine months in the year. Any college that attempts to put out graduates in less than three years attendance of nine months each will be thrown out of the "National Osteopathic Association." All the Osteopathic colleges must comply with the law. It is true that the course in the Medical colleges is strung out over four (4) years, but in the majority of cases it is only six months in the year.

Who will point out to me the advantage of a four years course of six months each? I am ready to be "shown."
