



TOOZE IN MARION COUNTY.

Most of the Prominent Republicans Against Him—Will be Beaten in His Home County by 1000 Votes.

SALEM, JAN. 15, 1906.

To the Editor:

The people of this county, who know Mr. Tooze, are not surprised to hear that he says he is the choice of Marion county for Congress, or at his pretense that he will get a large part of the vote that was for Mr. Moores before he withdrew. Nobody ever said that he was modest. He won't get a corporal's guard of Moores' vote, and while it is early in the campaign to make definite figures on any candidate it is an every day prediction here that he will be beaten in this county by at least 1000 votes.

As a sample of the situation here—a few republicans the other day, canvassed a list of all the Marion county republican ex-senators and ex-representatives who are now living in this county. These men come from all parts of the county, and from every walk in life, and their opinion is a fair index of the Marion county sentiment.

Of all these 33 men the only known supporters of Tooze are Graham, La Follett and Hofer, and of these three the only active worker is E. Hofer of the Capital Journal, who is managing Tooze's campaign. He should not count as a republican however as he was a Bryan Elector in 1896, and afterwards ran on the Democratic ticket for the legislature, and supported Bryan again in 1900, and also supported the democratic state ticket in the last state election.

Of the remaining thirty representatives who are named above, not one could be named who was for Tooze, although the preference of six of them was not known. More than two-thirds of them have openly declared their opposition to Tooze. Republicans who know the situation declare that he cannot get a statement signed by six men out of the whole forty-five who are named above that he is their

choice for Congress. Anybody who doubts what is stated about these men can get ample proof that it is true if he will visit this county.

Mr. Tooze seems to be proud of the fact that he is spending a great deal of money in this campaign, and likes to refer to what is published in the space he has bought in the newspapers as "the voice of the republican press" when nearly all of it is nothing but the voice of his money. It is now said that he has contracted for \$400 worth of advertising in the Salem Statesman. The Statesman has taken pains, and very properly, to say in its editorial columns that it will not support any candidate at the primaries, but that it will sell advertising space to any of the candidates. Mr. Tooze will have to furnish his own copy, as no one connected with the Statesman favors his nomination. When his \$400 begins to talk in the Statesman it will be interesting to hear what it has to say.

Voters in the rest of the district, who may be taking their cue from what is published in the newspaper space he has already bought ought to spend a few days in Marion county to understand why the sentiment against Mr. Tooze in his home county, where he is best known, is so strong.

About Hazelwood.

Interest in the dairy development of Newberg and vicinity is especially keen just now, owing to the establishment by the Hazelwood Cream Co. of a plant in this city. Newberg will have the full benefit of the highest price at which butter is sold in the Pacific northwest, and it is believed that this stimulus will add to the growth of the cream industry.

The Hazelwood Cream Co. acquired from Atkinson Bros. the creamery business which they had built up in this city, and are equipping it with new machinery to make it one of the best cream pasteurizing stations in this part of the country. They have placed one of their trained creamery men in charge of the plant and will put on teams for the collection of cream just as rapidly as the increase in dairying warrants. The plant has been operated by Hazelwood Co. since December 1st and the record of the last six weeks has been such as to greatly encourage the cream patrons.

"We hope to conduct the Newberg Creamery in such a way that Newberg will be proud of us as one of its best paying institutions," said A. H. Lea, Field Superintendent for the Hazelwood Cream Co. "We hope the business will grow to the point where more money comes to Newberg and vicinity through this creamery than through any other channel. The cream from this station is made into Hazelwood butter, which is the finest article produced, and which brings a higher price in Portland and in Puget Sound and throughout the Northwest than does any other butter. We are paying our patrons at Newberg on the basis of this selling price."

"This is the same profit-sharing method of business which has built up the dairy industry in so many sections of the Northwest, and incidentally which has built

up the Hazelwood Cream Co. We believe that we are the most successful profit sharing creamery in existence and we have the satisfaction of knowing that our success is not at the expense of the cream patron, for he has shared in it from the start and has obtained all the benefits of the highest price we have been able to get for our butter."

"We promise to do our share to build up the industry in Newberg by paying special attention to its needs and requirements. We don't want to hinder growth at any point and we want to help in every way possible. We certainly will produce the best butter that we can, and get the highest price for it."

"Right here we would like to give credit to Atkinson Bros. for what they have done towards building up the dairy industry. If it was not for six creameries having been here all these years the dairy industry in Newberg would not have grown to its present prosperity. Atkinson Bros. are delivering their cream to us, as are their former patrons, and we think that all see that there is more money in it for them in the new way than the old because of the high price which can be obtained for the Hazelwood brand of butter."

It is a far cry from the time when the farmers of this valley used to trade in dairy butter at the store once a week until now when their cream is handled by scientific methods and is made into the fanciest, costliest butter there is. It ought to be a pleasure to do business with a company which enjoys the reputation that the Hazelwood people have built up, and the Hazelwood people can be relied upon to do every thing to hold the loyalty of their patrons, for that is their fundamental policy.

The members of the Hazelwood firm are all farmers. It is only fifteen or sixteen years ago that they were peddling milk in the city of Spokane, Washington, and from the little dairy they had there, has grown their immense business. They still have their Hazelwood farm near Spokane—that is, the big farm that has grown up around the little farm they started with—and they seem to look at things from the farmer's point of view. It is said that they are always on the lookout for suggestions and complaints, so that wherever anything is wrong it can be remedied.

The Hazelwood creamery will carry the Hazelwood butter and Hazelwood ice cream at the plant for the accommodation of Newberg customers. The pride Hazelwood takes in being in Newberg is shown by the fact that the words "Hazelwood Cream Co., Newberg" are printed on the company's wagons.

New pasteurizing machinery of the most modern type and a new boiler are being installed. The company is now collecting over 4000 pounds of butter fat per month from Newberg and hopes to treble this amount by summer. A year from now they hope to have a far heavier output than this year as they believe that farmers will find it greatly to their advantage to buy cattle and go more into dairying. The Chehalem valley is an ideal place for dairying and the industry undoubtedly has a great future here.

Newberg was practically the starting point of the mutual system in Oregon and now nearly every town and a large proportion of the farm houses throughout the Willamette valley are connected with some mutual line. Newberg has 225 phones and has free service with the following named lines: Dayton with 222 phones, McMinnville 146, North Yamhill 151, Amity and Ballston 210, Sheridan 213, Dallas 258, Sherwood 70, Saint Paul 5, Champoe 12, Scholls, Tigardville and Hillsboro 850, making a total of 2362. This is not a case of "municipal ownership" but rather private ownership without any graft. The idea was laughed at by the big, rich companies a few years ago but the system has reached such proportions that it commands respect. This should serve as a pointer for the producing classes. There are many lines along which they might be of mutual benefit to each other if they would only combine their interests and pull together.
