That is the kind of consistency that characterizes a good many reformers, and one reason why so many of our laws are dead letters.

There are enough clean men in all the political parties to nominate clean, capable men to fill all the offices if they will only stir themselves in time to awaken interest before the primaries are held. Don't wait until you go to the polls and then be compelled to admit that you don't know anything about the candidates. It is your duty to know who they are and what they stand for.

The state press association made a good selection in the election of Carey Hayter, editor and publisher of the Polk County Observer, for president. Mr. Hayter believes that a newspaper should stand for something and there is the necessary personality and force about him to make a good official. It goes without saying that Albert Tozier was again elected secretary.

Mr. Tooze, in the platform he has published, says: "It is unnecessary for a lifelong republican who has always supported the principles and nominees of the republican party to do more than reaffirm his belief in sound finance, the doctrine of protection, and other cardinal principles of republicanism." Marion county republicans assert that Tooze does not dare to say squarely that he has always supported the nominees of the republican party, for it is notorious that he has tried to beat

republican nominees time after time, and that no man has been more vindictive and abusive in his political fights than he has been, or has done more to stir up factional trouble.

**TOOZE AND OLD GLORY.**

Mr. Tooze has been sending out all over the district a card representing the American flag to advertise his candidacy. On this he has crowded aside the stars in the blue field to make room for his picture and on the stripes he has printed his autograph and some other matter. One would suppose that almost any man, especially a would be Congressman, would know better than to thus openly defy the sentiment of reverence which the American people have for the symbol of nationality. Some years ago the veterans of the G. A. R. had a law passed in this state which they will not see violated. It is to be found on page 728 of Volume 1 of Belling and Cotton's Code, and reads as follows:

Par. 2091 United States Flag, Desecration of, Prohibited. Any person who in any manner, for exhibition or display, shall place or cause to be placed any words or figures, or numbers, or marks, or inscriptions, or picture, or design, or device, or symbol, or token, or notice, or drawing, or any advertisement of any nature whatever, upon any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, or shall expose or cause to be exposed to public view any such flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, upon which shall be printed, painted, or otherwise placed, or to which shall be attached, appended, affixed, or annexed, any words, or figures, or numbers, or marks, or inscriptions, or pictures, or design, or device, or symbol, or token, or notice, or drawing, or any advertisement of any nature or kind whatever, or who shall expose to public view, or shall manufacture, or sell, or expose for sale, or have in possession for sale, or for use, any article, or thing, or substance, being an article for merchandise, or a receptacle of merchandise, upon which shall have been printed, painted, or attached, or otherwise placed, a representation of any such flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, to advertise, or call attention to, or to decorate, or to ornament, or to mark, or to distinguish the article or thing, on which so placed, or shall publicly mutilate, trample upon, or publicly deface, or defy, or defile, or cast contempt, either by words or act, upon any such flag, standard, color, or ensign, of the United States, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and subject to a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

Par. 2092. Word "flag" etc., as used in act, what to include. The words flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, as used in this act shall include any flag, any standard, any color, any ensign, or any representation of a flag, standard, color, or ensign, or a picture of a flag, standard, color, or ensign, made of any substance whatever, or represented on any substance whatever, and of any size whatever, evidently purporting to be either of said flag, standard color or ensign of the United States, or a picture, or a representation of either thereof upon which shall be shown the colors, the stars and stripes, in any number of either thereof, or by which the person seeing the same, without deliberation may believe the same to represent the flag, or the colors, or the standard, or the ensign of the United States of America.
