Rev. W. E. McCutcheon preaches in the hall the first and third Sundays of each month.

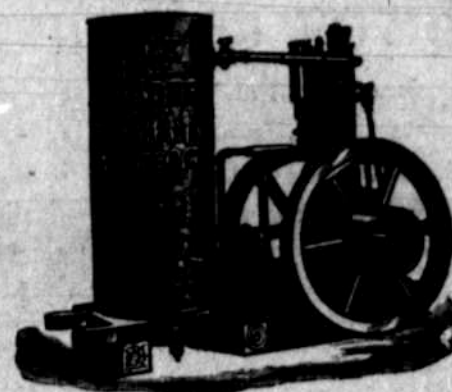

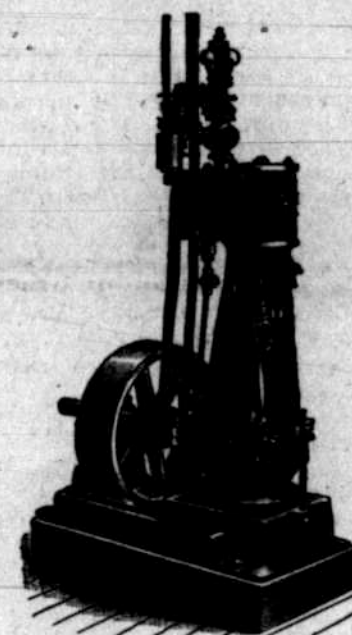
