The Graphic was asked a few days ago to advocate a cannery for Newberg. Our answer was given by extending an invitation to the gentleman to do the advocating act himself through the columns of the Graphic but he declined by saying it was the business of a newspaper to take the initiative in matters of local interest and there he "sawed off," so to speak. Well, as for a cannery at Newberg that depends. Newberg has made a few spasmodic attempts at the business in the past, at the instigation of dispensers of "hot air" who were out for a job, as well as by some whose intentions were honest enough but who were not fitted for the management of such an undertaking and the finale of every one of these attempts has been written by the one word "failure." Newberg has never shed any crocodile tears over these failures for our people are not built that way. The spirit shown all these years has been to get in and do things in the face of some past failures rather than sit down and say "I told you so." It is better to try and make some failures rather than risk the "dry rot." But back to the point at issue. In the first place is there business in sight for a cannery at Newberg at the present time? It looks like there might be when one looks about and sees the amount of cherries, small fruits and berries that are in sight. This is a matter that would need careful investigation. Springbrook has a well established plant near by and unless it is plain that there would be room for a second plant in the valley without inviting unjust competition, encouragement should not be held out for an investment of that kind in Newberg at the present time. Granting that there may be room for a canning plant at Newberg the next question at issue would be a man. Not one who could tell you all there is to be told about the canning business in a fifteen minute talk, and who stands ready to put up his valuable time and unlimited store of information against the other fellow's capital, but just a plain business man who has some capital and plenty of common sense and who is looking for such an opening. A plant running on a paying basis would certainly be a great factor in giving employment to labor and if an honest investigation should make it plain that the opening is here for it, we are here ready to do our part toward finding the man. This is the view the Graphic takes of the canning question for Newberg.

Because the Graphic undertook to jolly the Rabbitville man by suggesting that on account of the poor record his congressional district had made at Washington it would keep him busy on his own side to land a man for congress who would make good at the Capitol, he gets red in the face and among other things he says: "In making a short tour of the second congressional district we thought Walter Tooze seemed to have all the other candidates for congress on the hip, so to speak." Since Tooze is making the race in the first district the Graphic would suggest that "a tour of the second district," as Bennett says he made, would hardly enable him to correctly note the sentiments of the voters in the first district who are to decide this matter. But to be charitable it is better to concede that since the Rabbitville man is rather new at the business of making congressmen in Oregon

he got a little mixed on the two districts. Possibly he did invade the first district as far as Woodburn and it is no doubt easy for a man of his ability, who can go out before breakfast and count 4900 coyotes swimming the Columbia at Irrigon from the Washington to the Oregon side of the river, to figure up enough votes, even at the town of Woodburn, to down the whole district and nominate his favorite for congress, and do this too in the face of the fact that many Marion county people assert that Tooze will not be able to carry his own precinct. When an incompetent man is out for office it is the business of an honest newspaper to let it be known. That is what the Graphic proposes to do, then if the voters go wrong in this matter the writer will be clear and they will have no one to blame for results but themselves. In the meantime brother Bennett need not take any of his valuable time off to waste sympathy regarding the feed that will be masticated at this office between now and next June. The incubator may be warming up but it is a little early to count the poultry with such dead certainty.

People who are taxed to the limit to maintain a municipal government as we are in Newberg have a right to ask for judicious expenditure of the money and since the office of marshal and street commissioner is combined in one, those who have the appointing power should look for a man for marshal who has a faculty for doing street work in the best possible manner. This is a case where no favoritism should be shown, but rather the only object to be sought should be to find the man who will get the best results for the money that comes from the pockets of the people. Almost any man can throw a shovelful of dirt in a mudhole but the men are few who have a faculty for doing really first class road or street work. It is a science and it is no discredit to a man to say that he is not fitted by natural adaptability and training for such a position, but it is a discredit to a city council if they elect such a man to fill the office. The Graphic has no name to offer for the place but simply suggests that this is a case where good judgement should be shown in making a selection for a man to spend the people's money. If anyone takes a different view of the question the columns of the Graphic are open for the discussion of it.

If the rumor proves to be true that Huntington is connected with one of the companies that is figuring on a system of electric lines, with Portland as a central point, Portland and the Willamette valley will do well to set up and take notice and be ready to give him the glad hand. The Huntington electric system in Southern California is said to be the best system of electric lines in the world, and if he concludes to invade our territory he will no doubt give us a rapid transit system that will jar some of the slumbering natives.
