Corvallis publishes to the world that within the past year the volume of her business has increased from ten to one hundred per cent. Last year Corvallis was made a dry town under local option and all kinds of dire prophecies were made as to her future from a business standpoint. The only "panic" which results is felt by the liquor interests and allies.

The time has come when a man's moral, no less than his intellectual qualifications are taken into account when an office of great public trust is to be filled. The country has already too many men at Washington whose ability is not matched by moral integrity, the result being that that ability is turned in the wrong direction—inimical to the interests of the very people whom they are supposed to represent. And they are "good business men" too. Entirely too good. There has been more attention paid to business than to worthy legislation in many cases. And that is the source of the great upheaval in the political world which is ushering in the new era, characterized by the "square deal" slogan. Oregon's opportunity is at hand to redeem herself by electing to congress men of unquestioned fitness, both as to ability and moral integrity. There is at least one man in the race who does not measure up to the standard which an outraged commonwealth should insist upon. A greater calamity could hardly befall the state, especially under present conditions, than that such a man should be chosen to sit in congress as a representative of what Oregon stands for.
