The Woodburn Independent is trying to make capital for W. L. Toozie by calling one of his opponents the Rev. W. C. Hawley. No danger of any one putting a "Rev." before Mr. Toozie's name, rejoins the Albany Democrat.

The democrats of Benton county met and "suggested" candidates for office. In some counties they "invite" them, and in others they "mention" or "endorse" them. The Democrats are doing some lively sidestepping on the primary law, suggests the Observer, but are insisting on the republicans following it to the letter.

For the edification of Oregon newspapers, the editor of the Woodburn Independent feels called upon to announce that his paper is neither owned or controlled by Toozie, that the editorial opinions expressed are his own, and that Toozie is not allowed to dictate to him. And further, that he does his own thinking! Good! But why such violent assertion?

W. K. Newell has been appointed president of the State Board of Horticulture and commissioner-at-large in place of E. L. Smith, who resigned recently to become a candidate for the United States senatorship. This is a much deserved promotion for Mr. Newell, whose fitness for the position has been amply proven by his efficient work as commissioner for the first district. The appointment cannot but meet with general approval.

Newberg manufacturers should co-operate heartily with the committee of the Board of Trade toward securing a good display of Newberg-made goods to be placed in the Portland show windows, as explained elsewhere in these columns. Newberg is far in the lead of towns of its size, from a manufacturing standpoint, and can make an especially good showing in this line. This is the kind of an advertisement which will be worth while.

A. A. Jayne of Hood River, Wasco county, father of the iniquitous amendment to the local option law, which had such a history before the last legislature, is a candidate for renomination. In his platform he avers that he "believes in the letter and the spirit of the direct primary law, and will in every way encourage carrying out its provisions." In a leading editorial the Hood River News-Letter asks these pertinent questions: "Is not the primary election law a law established by voice of the majority, and was not the local option law also such a measure? And how did Mr. Jayne support this law of the people and a most important measure? Not only did he not support it, even while going from a community in which it was on trial, but he was found to be the only representative of the opponents of such a law could find to father their measure for its overthrow. Does this indicate fealty to the people's will, and what reason have we to expect more from him at this time?" The News-Letter is to be strongly commended for the brave stand it takes. Those who endeavor to thwart the will of the majority should be remembered. Their promises are worthless.

In an editorial setting forth the great importance of voters choosing good, conscientious legislative candidates to send to Salem next winter, the Portland Journal forcibly illustrates the need by giving aptly the following case in point: "In the event that the liquor dealers' amendment to the local option law, which is to be submitted to the people in June, fails of adoption, another effort will be made in the next legislature to repeal or materially alter the law. With this end in view the agents of the liquor interests have been secretly engaged in bringing out legislative candidates who will carry out their will. Their campaign has been carried on not only in Multnomah but in almost every other county of the state. It may be that the local option law requires some slight
