## HAWLEY'S STRONG LEAD.

The first preliminary canvass  
of Marion county, made by the  
friends of Willis C. Hawley, can-  
didate for Congress, has just  
been completed. The total regis-  
tration of the county shows  
about 4000 republican votes. Of  
these nearly 2000 are in the ten  
Salem precincts. The poll of the  
Salem precincts, giving all doubt-  
ful voters to the opposition,  
shows eighty per cent for Haw-  
ley. It is practically the same  
in Aurora, and higher than that  
in Hubbard. In Jefferson it is  
almost as large. The strength  
of the opposition is in Woodburn  
and the two Silverton precincts.  
Hawley may lose these, with  
possibly two others. The plu-  
ralities for Hawley in Aurora,  
Hubbard and Jefferson, and the  
ten Salem precincts, will rep-  
resent his plurality in the county,  
as the remaining precincts will  
more than offset any pluralities  
the opposition may secure in  
Woodburn and Silverton.

Mr. Hawley has visited every  
county in the district except  
Curry, Lake, Lincoln and Tilla-  
mook, and he has active workers  
in all of these. He has every  
assurance that he will have plu-  
ralities in ten of the seventeen  
counties, and more than an even  
chance in three of the remaining  
seven. A careful and very con-  
servative estimate, based upon  
reports from every part of the  
district, gives him forty-five per  
cent of the total republican vote.

Of course these claims will be  
disputed. To acknowledge them  
would be an open confession of  
defeat. Let the voter put this  
statement in his vest pocket and  
keep it there until April 21, and  
he will find that this estimate,  
like every other thus far made  
by the friends of Mr. Hawley in  
this campaign, has been more  
than verified. It is no longer a  
question as to his success but as  
to the amount of his plurality.

## Of Importance to Teachers and Patrons.

us.

make plans for the County Agri-  
cultural fair and to plan our in-  
stitute work for next year.

Let us make known by our at-  
tendance and zeal at this insti-  
tute the fact that the teachers  
and officers of this county are  
intensely interested in our work.

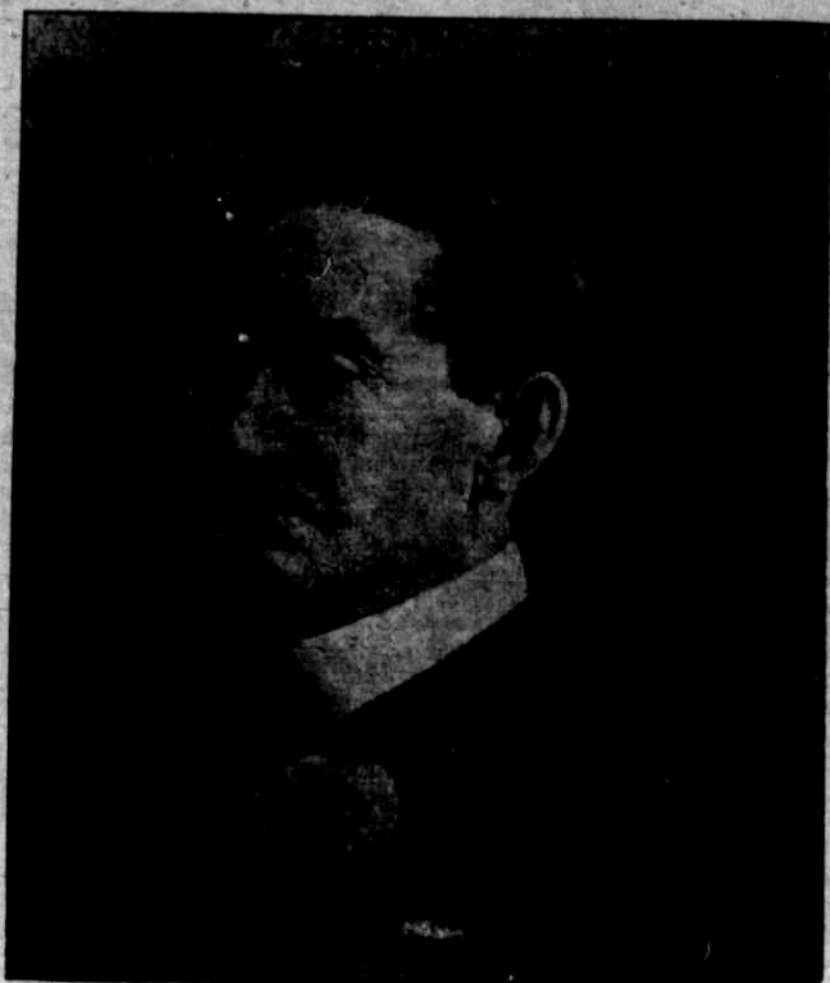
## Notice to Breeders.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR UNITED  
STATES SENATOR.

Champion of Statement One.

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate before the Republican primaries for the  
nomination of United States Senator in Congress, for the long term commencing  
March 4th, 1907, was born in New Bedford, Massachusetts, February 23d,  
1855; was a member of the class of 1877 at Harvard University; came to Port-  
land May 16th, 1878; was a Republican member of the Oregon Legislature in  
the session of 1885 and the extra session of 1886; was one of Oregon's dele-  
gates to the Republican National Convention of 1888 and Oregon's member of  
the Republican National Committee from 1888 to 1892, and a delegate to the  
Republican National convention of 1892; and was elected as a Mitchell Republi-  
can to the Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more prominently identified with the development of  
the mineral resources of Oregon than any other man in the state, having ex-  
pended in the last twenty years over \$1,000,000 of his own money in the ac-  
quisition and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his residence and main office at Portland since  
1878, he has had another office at New Bedford, Massachusetts, and has carried  
on the business of his father's estate since 1889, which makes him familiar  
with many of the large interests and leading men of the East. These quali-  
fications, in conjunction with his tremendous energy, originality, executive abili-  
ty and experience in business and political affairs pre-eminently qualify him for  
making an able and influential Senator for the State of Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored extending the direct power of the people  
over their government as far as possible. He was one of the leading spirits in  
the Initiative and Referendum movement from 1896 until it was approved by  
the voters at the June election in 1902. In 1904 he was a member of the ex-  
ecutive committee of the Direct Primary Nominations League, and holds the  
same position with the People's Power League at this time. In all these move-  
ments he has been one of the few to guarantee the necessary expenses of pre-  
paring and proposing their measures to the people.

He says that the choice of United States Senator should be by direct vote  
of the people, and that the Legislature should be compelled to elect the man  
the people select. To accomplish this result, he is championing Statement  
No. 1 of the primary elections law as the only method by which public opinion  
may be crystallized and made effective upon the Legislature.
