While the Graphic has said plainly who it is not in favor of for congressman, it has not declared itself editorially for either of the other two candidates, although the writer has been openly supporting one of them. Mr. Huston and Mr. Hawley are both able, clean men, either of which, if nominated, the Graphic will heartily support. But we believe it right to state our position to our readers, not so much with the idea of persuading them to vote as we intend to, but to state the situation as it looks to the man behind the pencil. The first desire of citizens who want to see a big man and a clean man go to Washington from the first district, is to defeat Toozee. To do that they would as a rule be willing to vote for the man who has the best show for beating him. While it is a difficult thing to correctly size up the situation over so large a territory, from various sources of information, traveling men especially, we believe that while Mr. Huston reached his maximum strength a few weeks ago, Mr. Hawley is steadily gaining and has passed him in the race for votes. If this is true, the votes cast for Hawley will be the ones which will go toward defeating Toozee. With this view of the situation the Graphic is for Hawley, especially as it sees in him an ideal congressman.

A final word regarding the candidacy of Toozee and the attitude which the Graphic has taken thereto. To begin with there is nothing personal in the fight which this paper has made against the nomination of the Woodburn candidate for congressman. The personal relations existing between the editors of the Graphic and Mr. Toozee, while never intimate, have never been otherwise than pleasant. The Graphic has opposed Toozee because it believes it would be nothing short of disastrous to send such a man to congress. It does not believe that a gambler, a saloon man and an egotist can properly represent the citizenship of Oregon at the National Capital. Mr. Toozee has been given ample time to deny that he is what the Graphic has intimated him to be, and more, to demand the proof. He has not done so because he knows damaging proof can be produced. "Look into this face. Does it look like a bad one?" is the bluff with which he has endeavored to answer the charges. If Toozee should be nominated the republicans would again fight on the defensive in the coming congressional campaign. In the face of the good material to select from, why such folly?

Governor Chamberlain said correctly in his speech here the other night that the people can no longer blame the party bosses for dictating the makeup of the party ticket. The voters are now the dictators. It's up to them to show that they can select better candidates than the bosses have been wont to do.

As a last word let us say that he who desires a big man, a broad man, a man who does things, a man who is not a braggart, who don't play to the galleries, but who is able, energetic and a loyal, moral man, then vote for Willis C. Hawley, for congress.—Roseburg Spokesman.

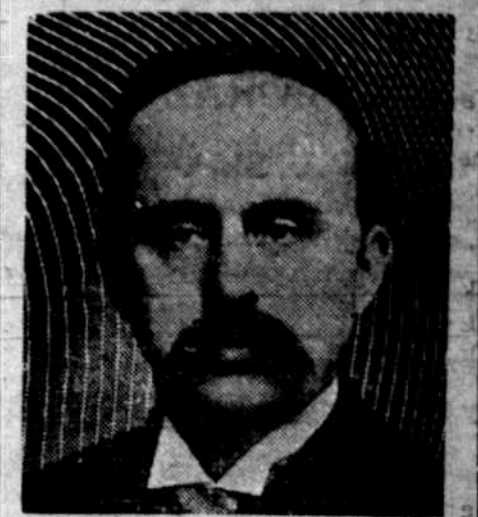
