The election on the water question held Tuesday proved decidedly one-sided, the vote standing 141 to 33 in favor of the proposed extension. Encouraged by the result, the council proceeded at once to make arrangements looking toward getting the work started as soon as possible, holding a meeting Tuesday evening and another last night. They hope if possible to get the new system installed yet this season, but this seems hardly probable.

J. J. Howser and Matthew Thompson, both of Blaine, Tillamook county, and both candidates for the republican nomination for joint representative, were in town together, or rather at the same time Monday and did some warm campaigning, on each other's tracks.

Mrs. H. M. Dobbins of Pasadena, California, who has been spending several months with Newberg relatives, expects to start home Saturday. She will be accompanied by her nephew, I. E. Stratton, who will assist her in developing some mining properties in the southern part of the state.

Mrs. Samuel Dimond died Tuesday evening, the funeral services being held at the Methodist church at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. The deceased leaves beside husband, a daughter three or four years old, and a three weeks old babe. The family had lived here but about one year, coming from Minnesota.

C. J. Edwards and the Spaulding Logging Company have united in the organization of the Yamhill Electric Company, incorporated, capitalized at \$25,000. The new company will erect a new and larger plant, three hundred horse power probably, which will be located near the sawmill and thus be nearer its fuel supply. The new plant will be in operation by fall and will in all probability furnish power as well as light. The new company has already made the Dayton people a proposition looking toward installing a system for them, which will no doubt be but the first step in the general plan of expansion as outlined.

The visit of W. C. Hawley to Newberg the first of the week developed very clearly the fact that he is easily the leader in this vicinity for the republican nomination for congressman. Mr. Hawley dealt thoroughly with the main issues before the people, handling them in a statesmanlike manner which inspired faith in his ability. His speech met general approbation and the Hawley men to be found in town the next day were thick as peas in a pod. He will get the big vote in Newberg.
