As a sequel to the incident or series of incidents which the Graphic made note of last week in mentioning the desertion of her husband by Mrs. B. E. There is universal sympathy with the young man and it is not thought that a jury can be found that will bring in any kind of a verdict against him—certainly not if the case were to be tried in this state. He will be given the best of counsel.

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
