A GOOD NOMINATION.

The Candidacy of Jesse Edwards for State Senator Meets With General Approval.

When the votes, that were cast at the primary election of April 20, were counted it was found that Jesse Edwards, of Newberg, had received a majority of 167 and he was declared the regular nominee for state senator on the republican ticket. Mr. Edwards was born in Indiana and he is now fifty seven years of age. He was brought up on a farm and although he has been active along other lines of business he has never entirely given up agricultural pursuits. In the fall of 1880 he removed with his family to Oregon and located in Yamhill county. During the first winter he resided in Dayton but in the following spring he located at Newberg which has been his home continuously for the past twenty-five years.

In politics he has always been an ardent republican but never until four years ago had he ever allowed his name to be used in connection with any office. At that time he was a candidate for senator before the republican county convention but was defeated by Mr. Howe, the latter being elected to the second term as senator.

At the recent primary election when the names of Mr. Edwards and Mr. Howe were submitted to the republican voters of the county, the result was as stated above.

As a man and a citizen Mr. Edwards has always been held in high esteem throughout the county and the reports that are coming in from all points since the canvass has opened, indicate that he is receiving strong support from all classes of people.

This was to be expected. For a quarter of a century he has been a resident of Yamhill county, and during all these years, while actively engaged in various business enterprises he has been a man of convictions, standing for the highest type of moral and material citizenship, a man among men in the common everyday pursuits of active life in Yamhill county.
