The tide has set in so strongly in favor of Withycombe that it is now conceded to be only a question as to the size of his majority.

If you are opposed to saloons and saloon influences just find out what the wholesale liquor dealers want and vote the other way. You will always find this a safe rule to follow.

For twenty-five years Jesse Edwards has been a resident of Newberg and all this time he has worked to give the children the best possible advantages for getting an education. A good record for any man, and it is a fact worth remembering when you are marking your ballot for state senator.

It remains to be seen whether a man can slide into office with the solid support of the whiskey element of the county on one hand and of the radical prohibitionists on the other. This would make a rare acrobatic stunt—something of a record breaker in fact. We shall see what we shall see.

When you enter the booth to mark your ballot remember that the proposed amendment to the local option law was prepared by the wholesale liquor dealers' association. It is but reasonable to suppose that these men will look out for their own interests. Be sure that you look out for yours by voting no on this proposition.

In marking your ballot be sure that you don't get mixed on the local option question. First there is the proposed amendment to the present local option law which is being fathered by the whiskey men and then there is the vote to be taken to make the present law operative in Yamhill county. Vote against the first proposition and for the second.

In the battle of ballots that was made for local option in this county two years ago, those who favored the law won out by a small majority, but by a little juggling on the part of the county court the will of the voters was thwarted. The issue is again before the voters and the majority should be made so large this time that success will be made doubly sure.

In the heat of a political campaign you will occasionally find a man who will work himself up to such a pitch that he will lie and misrepresent his neighbor who may be a candidate, and while there may be a few who will repeat these things for him, it nearly always reacts in favor of the man it was intended to injure. Plenty of rope given to the slanderer has been the means of electing many a worthy man.

A big crop of "Made in Oregon" strawberries are just coming into market and the demand for sugar and cream is on the increase. Growers would appreciate a little more sunshine to add color to the berries but the rains have been splendid for everything and farmers have great cause for thankfulness for the increased prospect for a fine crop. A farmer who can't raise a smile this season ought to be taking something for his liver.

Jesse Edwards is one of the heaviest taxpayers in the county and his children are all grown up and educated, but when the school meeting was held for the purpose of voting a tax for erecting a new public school building of sufficient size to accommodate our young and growing army of children, he was on hand, voting and working for a tax for the large and commodious structure of which Newberg is justly proud. This is the type of man you want to vote for to represent you in the state senate.

Two years ago when the local option measure was before the people for consideration it was asserted and reasserted that if the law should pass business

stagnation would follow. Has the assertion proved true? Not at all. On the contrary if you will go to Portland, the great business center of Oregon, you will find that there are more big business houses in course of construction than have ever been on the way before. See that you don't help the enemies of the law to make it of none effect by their iniquitous amendment.

The producing classes are often heard to complain, and justly too, that they are denied the representation they are entitled to, when political parties are making up their tickets. There is no cause for complaint this time however at the head of the republican ticket, for James Withycombe, candidate for governor, spent many years of his life on a farm in Washington county and the work he has done for the benefit of the farmers and dairymen since he has been connected with the Agricultural College is well known. If the farmers really care to be represented by one of their class the opportunity is at hand, and they should see to it that Withycombe is elected by an overwhelming majority. He is honest and capable, a man of clean habits and well fitted to fill the responsible position to which he aspires.
