



### Memorial Day Fittingly Observed at Newberg.

The old veterans and their friends were given a good day yesterday in which to pay respect to the memory of their fallen comrades, whose last resting places were strewn with a wealth of beautiful flowers.

Contrary to the custom here, the decoration exercises proper took place in the forenoon. The veterans, the W. R. C., and the sons and daughters, gathered on West First street, and led by the Newberg band, took up the march to the cemetery. Following them came a long line of public school children, by rooms, accompanied by the teachers. Citizens afoot and in vehicles brought up the rear. Arrived at the cemetery, position was taken up about the G. A. R. monument where the usual exercises were given.

In the afternoon an immense audience gathered in Duncan's opera house to hear the memorial program. The music for the occasion was furnished by the band, by a mixed quartet composed of the Misses Minerva Brouillette, Hazel Littlefield, and Prof. Carrick and Claire Buchanan, and by Susie Brouillette and Miss Littlefield, who rendered vocal solos. Miss Alice Durst served as accompanist.

The orders of Commandant Horton, who presided, were read by Adjutant Brouillette, and Lincoln's Gettysburg address by G. W. Allen, quartermaster.

The address, delivered by Dr. James Withycombe, was short and informal. He paid strong tribute to the service and sacrifice of the old soldiers, including the pioneers. To them he attributed much of our present national supremacy, politically and industrially. Referring to Oregon, of which he is so well qualified to speak after a residence of forty years in the state, he painted a glowing picture of her vast resources, largely undeveloped, and of the future citizenship which she will support. In this latter respect, he declared that after a long acquaintance with conditions in this neighborhood, he thoroughly believed that Newberg presented the highest degree of citizenship of any rural community in the state.

The invocation was given by Rev. H. L. Howard and benediction by Rev. W. S. Lowry.

The exercises were carried out in prompt order, and were concluded before the audience became wearied.

### Exciting Field Meet.

An interesting field meet took place on the college grounds Friday afternoon between the Newberg High School and the academic department of the college. The score, 79 to 24, in favor of the Academy, was rather one sided but in no manner indicates the interest in the contest. The different events, the runs in particular, were hotly and closely contested and the academy boys were forced to earn all that came their way. Both teams were liberally supported by rooters, making the day one of greater excitement than is the case in many of the intercollegiate meets.

### Reduced Summer Excursion Rates to Newport and Yaquina Bay.

Sunday excursions to Newport on the C. & E. will begin June 10th or 17th and run every Sunday thereafter, leaving Albany at 7:30 a. m.; leave Corvallis 8 a. m.

S. P. Trains connect with the C. & E. at Albany and Corvallis for Yaquina and Newport. Trains on the C. & E. for Detroit will leave Albany at 7:30 a. m., enabling tourists to the Hot Springs to reach there the same day. Trains from and to Corvallis connect with all East Side trains on the S. P.
