



AFFAIRS OF THE CITY.

Monday being a legal holiday, the city council, on meeting in the evening, adjourned until Wednesday evening at which time Councilmen Brouillette, Woodward, Taylor, Harold and Gilbert answered to roll call.

A petition was granted asking for a sidewalk on the east side of College street from First street south to Jesse Edwards' residence.

In answer to a petition presented by workingmen, bicycle riders were given the privileges of the sidewalk, except on First street, from six to seven o'clock in the morning, and from six to seven in the evening.

The business men of the town, represented by L. M. Parker, W. W. Hollingsworth and J. C. Colcord, appeared before the council, stating that they had been able to raise \$35 toward hiring a night watch, and asking the city to appropriate \$15, thus making a salary of \$50 for which such officer could be secured. The council acted favorably, with the understanding that the night watch should be sworn in as deputy marshal.

In view of the fact of the marshal's duties being lightened by a deputy, action was taken reducing the salary from \$40 to \$30 per month.

The matter of repairing cemetery fence bounding city property was introduced, which, together with that of repairing the foot bridge, was referred to committee on streets and public property.

A vote on marshal was called. The first ballot read, Stanley 1, Woods 2, Sykes 2, the second and third, Woods 2, Sykes 3; the third Woods 3, Sykes 2. No one receiving a majority and the council being unable to elect, Wm. Clemmens was appointed to serve for the month of June.

ELECTION SUMMARIES.

The complete election returns from over the state will not be in for several days yet in all probability, but the pluralities can now be estimated pretty accurately, as follows:

Gov. Chamberlain (dem) re-elected by 2500.

Jonathan Bourne Jr. (rep) elected U. S. senator over Gearin by 2500.

F. W. Mulkey (rep) elected for the short term in U. S. senate without opposition.

W. C. Hawley (rep) for congress, First District by 4,000.

W. R. Ellis (rep) for congress, Second District by 15,000.

Stevens (rep) elected sheriff of Multnomah county over Tom Word by 14.

Republican state ticket by 25,000.

The Oregon legislature is overwhelmingly republican. There will not be a single democrat in the lower house and but six in the upper.

The returns have not yet been given on all the various amendments, but the result on some is known. Women's suffrage is lost by 10,000; the amendment to the local option law is lost by 10,000; appropriation bill, gross earnings tax, and anti-pass bills carried and probably Barlow toll road bill.

In this county the result is greatly mixed. Chamberlain, Galloway and Gearin get pluralities ranging from 96 to 114. In the county ticket, Caldwell (dem) is elected state senator by 51; Bones (rep) and Crawford (rep) are elected representatives by pluralities of 594 and 325 respectively; Bird (rep) for county judge by 77; Corrigan (dem) for sheriff by 583; Jones (rep) clerk by 231; Booth (dem) re-elected commissioner by 11. Other county officials, republican, re-elected without opposition.

Later returns give a majority of 260 for prohibition instead of 251 as given elsewhere in these columns.

State G. A. R. Encampment invited to Newberg.

On the twentieth of this month the State Encampment of the G. A. R. will be held at Grants Pass. This annual meeting is always looked forward to with great anticipation by the old soldiers, but more especially is it the case with the Newberg comrades this year, on account of an effort which they will make to bring the 1907 Encampment to Newberg. A hearty invitation has already been extended and it is believed that it will meet with general approval.

In the New York Legislature.

Recently there was a contest in New York for and against osteopathy. Senator Hinman introduced a bill regulating its practice. It failed to pass but it was only after a strenuous fight. It was opposed, of course, by the M. D.'s and their friends. All the newspapers of the state save two or three, favored the bill, and wrote editorials commending the osteopaths to fair play by the Legislature. The bill passed the Senate by a vote of 31 to 13. It then went to the Assembly and was referred to the Committee on Rules. By the treachery of one man it was buried there. Osteopathy has gained great favor though, by the publicity given it by the contest. The public showed that they wanted it. There were more than 150 petitions sent in to the legislators with from 50 to 4000 names on each, favoring the bill. Telegrams, letters and personal requests poured in, from the osteopaths and their friends, on the different members of the Legislature to the number of 300,000. It is conceded by all that if it had come to a vote in the Assembly it would have passed. The members say that no bill in twenty-five years has called out such an avalanche of demands for its passage as did the Hinman Osteopathy Bill.
