The "straight tickets" which we have been hearing so much about were found to be so few and far between as to be mere strays, when the votes were counted.

It seems about time to qualify the statement that Oregon is a republican state. She is something of a hybrid—republican when she feels like it, but very uncertain as to her feelings.

The election evidently didn't go exactly to suit the weather man. But he forgets that the rain falls alike upon the just and the unjust. He should be more discriminating.

"Hands off?" say the people to the liquor dealers who would tamper with the local option law, and they say it with the decisive majority of 10,000 votes. The liquor interests may get it pounded into them after while that the people of Oregon knew what they were doing when they declared for local option.

Let's not have any more kicks coming from the farmers that we are governed by politicians and professional men and that they are disregarded. One of the best men Oregon can produce, against whom nothing can be said, who has done more for the farmers than any man in the state, and a farmer himself, has been turned down for governor for an oily politician—and turned down by the farmers themselves.

Newberg has more than maintained her reputation as a supporter of the local option law. Two years ago there were 111 votes cast against the measure while on Monday, in the face of a much larger vote than was polled then, there were but 90 votes registered in favor of the amendment to the law, introduced by the liquor dealers. The majority for the law as it is was 354. No other place in the state has so clear a record.

Yamhill county votes for prohibition by a majority of 251 votes, as against a meager majority of 12 given two years ago. This majority is decisive and the county court will probably be somewhat chary of setting it aside as it did before. It is interesting to note that without the Newberg vote prohibition would have been short in the county by one vote, but these two precincts came to the rescue with a majority of 252.

It is Congressman Hawley now, and all Oregon will point to him with pride. He ran against a Galloway, a family of proverbial vote getters, but was elected by a majority of some 3500 to 4000 votes. And with each succeeding election the Graphic predicts that this will be increased, as in the case of Congressman Tongue, who went in the first time by a scratch, 63 votes to the good, but whose majority the last time he was elected was something over seven thousand.

In one of the hottest political fights in the history of the county, F. H. Caldwell is elected state senator by a narrow margin, and as such has the best wishes of all good citizens for an honorable and efficient term. His opponent, Mr. Edwards, goes down to honorable defeat wrought by dishonorable methods. It can safely be attributed to treachery in the North Newberg precinct and to the defection of Ex-senator Howe and his supporters in Carlton. This fellow Howe was

elected for two terms by his party, and because the republicans of the county saw fit in the direct primary to honor another man, he sulked and threw his strength to Mr. Edwards' opponent. As a result, Carlton, instead of giving him the normal republican majority, went against him by some 64 votes. Such is politics.

Judged by the vote in the two Newberg precincts, there were two amendments before the people upon which there was but little room for argument. Those calling for a tax on the gross earnings of sleeping car, refrigerator car and oil companies and upon express, telegraph and telephone companies, received almost the unanimous vote.

The horrid, selfish men have again condemned woman to servitude and thralldom. But the women suffragists say they will continue to agitate and wage another campaign between now and the next campaign. Heaven spare us! This announcement should have been made before the election. Many a man would have given up, discouraged, and voted for equal suffrage as the less of two evils. By the way Newberg men proved their gallantry by giving a majority of 140 for the amendment.

The Trotting Horse.

It is a mistaken idea which many people at least pretend to have that the trotting-bred horse is purely a fun horse, private or public, and good for nothing except for racing purposes and fancy road use. Indeed, if among the multiplicity of breeds of horses there is really an all-purpose animal it is the trotting-bred horse.

To be sure the American trotter is the only harness race horse and practically the only gentleman's road horse, but by no sort of means do these cover the channels of its usefulness. Indeed, they are scarcely the beginning. In point of strength and endurance, pound for pound in weight, no other breed is the equal of the trotter and as now bred they have size and strength for every use save that of heavy draft work and even at this a team of full-made, sixteen hands, 1300 pound trotters—a size class which is by no means uncommon at the present day—will readily do the work of a pair of 1600 pound draft horses.

As a general farm horse the trotter is the nearest the ideal of any breed. It is quick to step, kind of disposition—if not managed by brute force—makes much better time with plow or farm wagon and is suitable for more varieties of work than is any other horse. It will do more work and consume less feed. For drawing the reaper, mower, cultivator, the spring wagon on a hurried jaunt, the family carriage or in cantering away after the family physician, it is so far superior to the draft horse that comparison becomes odious. As a coach and carriage horse the trotter has no rival, while as a saddler, when educated a little to the work, it is the rival of the famous Danmarks, Harrison Chief, Peacocks and Red Squirrels.

The trotter is the family horse of all horses, for it has more sense, courage, docility and kindness than any other breed. Another mistaken idea with many who fancy and breed trotters is that trotting brood mares should not be worked about the farm as other brood mares are worked, and that prospective track horses are too good to be used on road work in doing the ordinary business and pleasure driving incident to farm and country life, the prevailing idea being that track work is the only thing. The time now is when a horse, even for racing purposes, must be in reality harness broke and way wise. Use trotters if you have them around for everything and you will soon have a very different estimate of the trotting breed as a whole.—Rural Spirit.
