Pertinent Questions from the County Seat.

A majority of the people of Yamhill County have voted in favor of prohibiting the liquor traffic within the county. What the remote effect will be, remains to be seen; the immediate effect on McMinnville is summed up, in part as follows: The loss of \$2400 per year in license fees; the loss of \$900 per year in water and light receipts; the repayment of nearly \$1100 of license fees already collected; the loss of \$1500 rents, aside from the hotels. Some interesting questions can be answered only after months of waiting. Will the buildings vacated by the saloons be occupied by other business? Will the number of criminal cases in the Recorder's court decrease or increase? Will drunkenness be more or less prevalent? Will liquors be sold in drug stores and "blind pigs," thus intensifying the evils of the worst saloons? Will the general result be for the upbuilding and betterment of the city, or will it give us as great or greater evils than now exist, masked under other names. Some predict that the harvest will be an uplift of the morals of the community, a better observance of law, an increase in all lines of legitimate business. Others think we shall reap a crop of drunkenness, of disorderliness, of general disobedience to law, of business depression. Time will tell which is right.—Telephone Register.

It is a condition and not a theory which now confronts McMinnville. The questions asked above must be answered by the citizens of the county seat alone. However, as an outsider, the Graphic may be permitted the expression of an opinion or two.

The loss of that \$2400 license has for years been a bugaboo to the tax payers of McMinnville. Just mention prohibition and they clutch wildly at their money bags and go straight up in the air as if the poorhouse stared them in the face. In fact, while they hardly realize it, they have become in a certain sense dependent upon the revenue from their saloons. This is deplorable, and we believe it a good thing for them that their moorings have been cut away. We have more confidence in the good people of McMinnville than they seem to have in themselves. They will prove to themselves and others that they can manage city affairs successfully without the aid of the saloon and all that goes with it. With far less taxable property Newberg has always done so—why not McMinnville?

There may be a little more tax to be paid by some of the retired capitalists who have sat themselves down at the county seat to spend the rest of their days in counting the contents of the old stocking leg and in computing interest; but it will be admirable discipline for them. What are a few paltry dollars to self-respect anyway?

What if the saloon buildings are vacant for a time? What better advertisement than an empty saloon anyhow? Especially with the kind of people who are most desirable. They had better remain empty than filled with men and boys spending their substance in riotous living.

As to the business in the Recorder's court, that's up to the officers. If there's a Tom Word in McMinnville, the question will be easily answered. If the officers, supported by the citizens, make themselves masters of the situation, they can make McMinnville a town to be proud of.

Brace up! Let the grog shops go and say good riddance. We would hate to think that the prosperity of our county seat depends upon a few saloons. And it doesn't.
