Whose Boy Shall It Be?

A resident of Newberg and a mother of children, who got excited at the trial Tuesday over the turn affairs took at the close of the proceedings, asserted with considerable warmth that "anybody had a perfect right to drink who wanted to," which in a sense is true so long as they don't interfere with the rights of others. However it is well for people who have the matter under consideration to remember that "drink" in its effects is no respecter of persons. That one mother's children with like surroundings, have no more assurance of being immune from the blasting influences of the drink traffic than those of another.

Only last week a newspaper dispatch from Aberdeen, Washington, told of the finding of the bodies of two young men floating in the Wishkah river, one of which was the body of a day laborer who worked in this community until recently, and his passion for drink seemed to be beyond his control. He was a common laborer—he was drowned—he was buried.

Not a month ago Henry Mel drum of Oregon City, surveyor general for the state of Oregon for many years, faced a federal judge after having been convicted of forgery on twenty-one counts, and before sentence was pronounced his attorney plead for leniency on the grounds that the convicted man was of a good family, that he had held many prominent positions of trust and never before had he gone wrong, but that in his younger days he had formed an appetite for drink which had at last got the better of him and he had fallen.

The sentence was a fine of something more than \$5000 and three years in jail.

Whiskey is no respecter of persons and the mother who stands up in the presence of her children and asserts that "people have a right to drink if they want to," is liable at some time in the future to feel the force of the admonition that "They who sow to the winds shall reap the whirlwind."

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
