Hey there! It is hay everywhere throughout the valley this season and the quality is the very best.

Long live Tom Richardson, the main cog in the Portland Commercial Club, and father of a new ten pound baby girl since Monday night. Tom is good looking, Mrs. Richardson is handsome and the little one is said to be the pink of perfection.

In brains and ability Senator La Follette is head and shoulders above four fifths of his colleagues and that is the reason a lot of cheap politicians are throwing clubs at him. He has the courage of his convictions and the obstructionists may as well stand aside.

The name of Judge Thomas F. Ryan, of Oregon City will go down in history. He is the father of triplets, two daughters and a son appearing in his family Monday. That beats holding the office of state treasurer, a position to which he aspired at the primary election.

The Oregon Supreme Court handed down a decision Tuesday, deciding the law providing for the exemption from taxation of householders property to the extent of \$300 to be unconstitutional. It is estimated that property amounting to \$8,000,000 in value has been exempted in the state from year to year under this law.

Russell Sage died the other day about a month short of ninety years of age, leaving a fortune which is reputed to amount to \$100,000,000 and ranking as the richest man in New York. The spirit of thrift he maintained to the last, leaving his fortune to the care of Mrs. Sage, who, he had good reason to know, knew better how to keep it together than any other person he could name.

The jar was on exhibition at the Chicago Worlds Fair, the Omaha Exposition, the Charleston Exposition and the Lewis and Clark Fair and still the plums are in good condition and make a fine appearance. Egg plums are good lookers, but sour—the temper of the old maid of tradition would hardly equal it.

In commenting on the sentence pronounced on Ed Kinney last week in Judge Linnville's court the Columbia Register says: "This is the kind of law enforcement that makes prohibition prohibit. When a man assumes that the law is made for a few, and just because he is engaged in the liquor traffic there is no law that he is bound to obey, he is a mighty poor citizen. There would not be so many law breakers in the liquor traffic if we had more courts like the one in Yamhill county and Judge McBride's of this district.

It is a safe rule to lay down to resolve to keep within the bounds of the law. It is all the same whether it is a city ordinance or state law.

Governor Folk, in addressing the retail merchants of Missouri at their convention last Thursday, spoke against the mail order business and favored advertising in the town papers. He said: "I do not believe in the mail order citizen. If a place is good enough for a man to live in and make his money in, it is good enough for him to spend his money in. No merchant can succeed without advertising in one way or another. Patronize your town papers, build them up, and they will build the town up, and build you up increased trade and greater opportunities."

The day when men could drink and carouse and still hold responsible positions is past and the sooner young men who are starting out in life make up their minds to meet the demands of those who they are going to look to for employment the better it will be for them. Many of the largest railroad systems in the country have laid down the rule that any employee who patronizes saloons shall be discharged and this custom is gradually working down to the smaller corporations, so that in a few years the boozier will have little show for holding any position of trust. The Junction City Times in commenting on this question says: "The hired man who neither smokes, chews or drinks is worth \$5 more per month on any farm than if addicted to these habits, and the time is coming when this will be recognized. There are farmers to-day who will not allow smoking and drinking, and where the man is taken into the family, they are drawing the lines still closer. Others will not keep a man who swears at and around the stock. A good clean character will add to the salary of any man, besides saving of expenses.

### A Rare Book.

A few weeks ago the Graphic made mention of the fact that the Oregon Historical Society had begun a reprint through the Quarterly, of a book published in 1846 by Overton Johnson and Wm. H. Winter, giving a description of Oregon and California as seen by the writers in 1843. The statement followed that so far as known only two copies of this important source of Oregon history were in existence, the library of the University of California and the library of Congress each having a copy.

The statement was read by John I. Hadley, of Springbrook, just the same as he has read everything else that has appeared in the Graphic since the first number appeared eighteen years ago, and he at once called to mind the fact that in his library were some old books that had formerly belonged to his grandfather, William Macy who lived near Mooresville, Indiana. He at once took a look among them and was rewarded by finding a copy of the identical book by Johnson and Winter. A few days ago he brought it to the office for our inspection and it is now on the table.

The book bears the imprint of "John B. Semans, Printer, La-Fayette, Indiana," and is in a good state of preservation. In typographical appearance it is not very different from the books of today, but it is interesting to note the spelling of some of the geographical names. For instance the Santiam river is mentioned as the "Sandy Yam" and the Chehalem valley is given as the "Shohalem Valley."

Mr. Hadley will probably loan the book to the Oregon Historical Society until such a time as Pacific College shall have better library facilities, when he will present it to the college.
