All Other Valley Towns Distanced in Freight Shipments.

The monthly statement of the Pacific Northwest Car Service Association is at hand and through the courtesy of station agent James, the table showing the number of cars of freight shipped from all points on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon is herewith given.

The table is of special interest to Newberg since it shows that during the month of July 166 cars of freight were shipped from this point, this being 29 more than were shipped from any other point on the lines with the exception of Portland.

Dallas follows with 137, Salem the capital city of Oregon 128 and McMinnville the second town in Yamhill county 36.

Why Fred Grant Doesn't Drink.

When I was a boy at school, and at West Point, I was made

a pet because of the greatness of my father. I was given every opportunity to drink and I did drink—some. As I got older and mixed with men, war-scarred veterans who fought with my father would come up, and, for the sake of old times, ask me to celebrate with them the glory of past events, and I did—some.

Then when I was made Minister to Austria, the customs of the country and my official position almost compelled me to drink, always. I tried to drink with extreme moderation, because I knew that alcohol is the worst poison a man can take into his system, but I found it was an impossibility to drink moderately.

I could not say when drink was placed before me: "No, I only drink in the morning," or at certain hours. The fact that I indulged at all compelled me to drink on every occasion, or be absurd.

For that reason, because moderate drinking is an impossibility I became an absolute teetotaler—a crank, if you please. I will not allow it even in my house. When a man can say, "I never drink," he never has to drink, is never urged to drink, never offends by not drinking. At least that is my experience.

Remember, I do not say, "Moderate drinking is harmful." The fact is, maybe, it isn't so harmful, but this fact is indisputable—the hard drinker was once a moderate drinker, and the chances are all against a moderate drinker remaining such, and I—well, I, for one don't propose to take such chances.

I know a man—maybe two or three—who died moderate drinkers. The stuff didn't seem to hurt them much. But the poor devils that I know, scores and scores of them, intelligent men, talented and all that, who have been ruined, disgraced, by the greatest curse of Christendom—drink! Ah, the picture is a sad one.

In many respects a hard drinker is a safer man in the army—and elsewhere, too, than a moderate drinker. That is, one who gets drunk once a year or so. You see, a hard drinker is known. No important commission is ever his to execute. But your moderate drinker, why, he's apparently capable. On the surface he's all right. Consequently he's given an important duty to perform. Then he drinks. He's sure to just at that critical time, to steady his nerves—infernal idiocy—and fails ignominiously to himself and to his family and disastrously to others.

Give me the sober man, the absolute teetotaler every time. He's dependable. If I had the greatest appointive powers in the country, no man would even get the smallest appointment from me unless he showed proof of his absolute teetotalism.

Pure Water at Eugene.

Last spring Eugene suffered from a typhoid epidemic due to bad water supply. Since that time the water company has abandoned the old wells and installed filters, taking water from an entirely new source with the result that a test of filtered water just made by the state board of health reports our present supply very pure and safe to use for all purposes. The report is as follows:

Dr. Robert C. Yenney, State Health Officer, Postland Ore.

Dear sir—The examination of the specimen of water from Eugene sent by Dr. Harris shows no contamination. There was an absolute failure to produce gas or even growth in ferment-

ation tubes. Plates inoculated with varying quantities of the water failed to develop a single colony on any one.

The result is most remarkable and I fear an error somewhere before the water arrived here. It would be well to know just how this water was collected. Even the purest water usually shows some growth.

The samples referred to were taken direct from the mains by Dr. J. W. Harris, county health officer, and sent to Portland the same day, water being received in same condition in which it was taken from the pipes.

Genuine Osteopathy.

The osteopath must pass through a course of training of three years, studying nine months each year before the college will grant him a diploma. Any others who claim the power to confer the degree of D. O., (Doctor of Osteopathy) are "professional pirates." The genuine colleges of osteopathy are one each in Los Angeles and San Francisco, Cal., Franklin, Ky., Des Moines, Iowa, Boston, Mass., Philadelphia, Pa., Chicago, Ill., Kirksville, Mo., Buffalo, N. Y. (this last one has been merged with the parent school at Kirksville, Mo.) The one at Des Moines, Iowa, is named "Still College," in honor of Dr. A. T. Still, the founder of the science. The founder's school at Kirksville is known as A. S. O. (American School of Osteopathy.)

The cost of the apparatus alone in the eight colleges runs up into the thousands of dollars; this does not include the buildings. In the Kirksville College the apparatus alone, exclusive of furniture and fixtures totals \$9000. The seventy (70) microscopes for Histology (microscopic anatomy) Pathology and Bacteriology are valued at \$2,900. The apparatus for research in Physiology cost over \$2000, and that in Chemistry nearly \$900, while the X-ray equipment cost over \$900.

The main building cost over \$100,000 and the new hospital and fixtures nearly \$40,000. The other colleges have gone to a proportionate expense and it is not reasonable to suppose that intelligent people would thus foster a business that has no future.

The college from which we graduated is the largest and best of its kind in the U. S. The American Osteopath Association determines whether a college meets all the requirements, has a right to issue diplomas and grant the degree "D. O." (Doctor of Osteopathy) to their students.

If one decides to take treatment it is important to have the skill of a regularly qualified osteopath. See to it that he or she is a graduate of a recognized osteopathic college. Ask to see his diploma no matter where you take the treatment. You must distinguish the wheat from the tares; for in osteopathy there is a haven of refuge for the sick and the afflicted that is destined to revolutionize the healing art.
