



Sad Case of Drowning.

Another casualty was added to the seemingly long list of fatalities that have come to this community during the past twelve months, when the accidental drowning of Chalmer, the ten year old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Newhouse, of Springbrook, was reported on last Saturday morning.

On Friday Mrs. Newhouse and the children, in company with Mrs. S. W. Newhouse, drove to Meadow lake where they expected to spend a few days visiting with Mrs. C. E. Newhouse's sister, Mrs. Charles Shires. Soon after their arrival there the unfortunate boy, in company with his younger brother, went to the lake, which is a short distance from the house, where they found an old scow that was fastened with a chain. Climbing into the scow they were swinging it around in the water when Chalmer fell overboard and sank out of sight. The little fellow screamed for help but before it arrived it was too late, for when the body was taken from the water the life had gone out.

The remains were brought home that evening arriving late at night, while the sorrowing mother and children with other relatives followed next day.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, services being conducted at the home where a large number of neighbors and friends gathered to lend what little comfort they could to the grief stricken family.

Mr. and Mrs. Newhouse have asked that a word be said for them in appreciation of the many kindnesses shown them, both by the people at Meadow lake and by the people of this community, but it was a case where the heartstrings were touched and the kindest hearted neighbors and friends realized that it was little they could do to add comfort to the broken hearted.

Helpful Hints.

To be of most value, beans must have long, slow, continuous cooking.

For bread, flour should be warm enough to favor the growth of the yeast plant.

If you get too much bluing in the rinsing water, put in a little household ammonia.

A little milk added to the water in which silver is washed will help to keep it bright.

The daily use of asparagus is detrimental, producing trouble with the urinary organs.

Add two tablespoonfuls of vinegar to every gallon of water in which fish is boiled.

Before scalding milk rinse out the pan with cold water. This will keep the milk from burning.

A little flour spread over the top of cakes before they are iced will prevent the icing from running off.

To revive the lustre of morocco or any other leather, apply the white of an egg with a sponge.

In blowing out a candle, hold it aloft and blow upwards. This will prevent the scattering of the grease.

Use a little ammonia in the dish water when washing glassware. It will make it sparkle like cut glass.

Hold a piece of white cloth back of the eye of a needle and see how quickly the thread will go through.

Sausages should be served with apple sauce or baked tomatoes. Either makes them more easily digested.

The object of cookery is to render food more palatable, more easy of digestion, and to retain all the nutriment.

Baking the potato is the best way to preserve the nutritive value, and at the same time render them palatable.

When cleaning knives, mix a tiny bit of carbonate of soda with the bath-brick, and they will polish more easily.

When making a fruit tart always cut a little slit in the center of the crust and insert either a straw or a paper funnel, so that the steam may escape.
