



City Council Adopts Route for New Water System.

At an adjourned meeting of the City Council held Monday evening, important action was taken relative to installing the extension to Newberg's water system. The Council has heretofore been working on the general plan of establishing the reservoir on or near the Pontallier place south-east of the Snider spring which is to be tapped. From there as nearly a direct route as possible was projected to Newberg, coming into town on Main street.

A new plan has come up for discussion recently however, and after careful consideration was unanimously adopted Monday evening. According to it the reservoir will be brought nearer to town and farther east and will probably be located on the Enos Ellis place, at an elevation corresponding to that of the present reservoir. From there a straight line can be laid to town entering on College street, a distance of two miles, and almost wholly along the public road, doing away with complications arising from the securing of numerous rights of way.

By this plan it will be noticed that the two reservoirs will be considerably less than a mile apart. When in the course of time the present line shall have given out the old mains can be abandoned it thought best and mains laid the short distance from the present reservoir to the new, thus giving Newberg a united system rather than two disconnected ones. With this in mind the new reservoir to be constructed will in all probability have a capacity of at least half a million gallons. A larger pipe, something near a twelve inch, from the reservoir to town is also contemplated, the decreased distance making this possible from a financial standpoint.

Having arrived at a definite understanding and decision in this important matter it is the intention of the Council to push the work as fast as possible. The money obtained by the sale of bonds has arrived and is ready for use. The water committee was empowered, with City Attorney Butt, to proceed in locating and securing a reservoir site, employing an engineer to make all necessary surveys and specifications and in short to get things moving.
