Newberg is being honored this week by having the opportunity to entertain a representative body of Oregon women.

Seattle subscribed more than \$500,000 in one day for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Fair stock. That is the Seattle spirit.

The Newberg public schools opened the first day with an enrollment of 404. What it might have been with a Dr. Large in town, the same as Forest Grove has, is beyond conjecture.

Portland is putting forth a herculean effort to raise a fund of \$385,000 for building and equipping new Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. quarters. They can't afford to fail, but since Saturday night is the time limit and \$37,000 a day must be subscribed they will have to get busy.

The school fair held at McMinnville last week was voted a success by all who attended it. Beside the school exhibits there was considerable good stock shown and withal it was a very creditable showing of Yamhill products made at a nominal cost. A full list of the premiums has been received but it came too late for publication this week.

E. R. Bradley issued a twenty page anniversary number of the Hood River News-Letter last week that will add more fame to the already famous Hood River country. It is well illustrated and from a typographical standpoint it would reflect credit on any office in Oregon. Mr. Bradley's work is always first class and the people of Hood River have reason to feel proud of this special edition of the News-Letter.

There is general complaint throughout the valley of loss in the prune crop. For some reason not entirely clear the fruit failed to ripen up in good shape this season and the hot weather immediately following the rains, that came about the time drying began, caused much of the fruit to spoil. The amount saved will probably fall at least one half short of what was expected a month ago. The price is stiffening up a little.

With the start the San Jose scale has on fruit trees it is evident that a very vigorous war must be made against this pest if we have any marketable fruit. It is recommended that spraying for the scale should commence as early as November when the leaves are off the trees. There are many trees that should be dug up and burned, root and branch if the owners don't care

to go to the trouble and expense of spraying. Old neglected trees serve as a breeding ground for pests that should not be tolerated. Such neglect is a menace to the fruit business.
