It is generally conceded that there are more "isms" in religious belief to the square mile in Southern California than in any other spot in the whole country. The latest is a craze known as the "Gift of Tongues" which has recently struck Los Angeles. All day and all night sessions are held and those who take part in the movement claim to be able to talk in "unknown tongues." This new cult is causing about as much of a furore as the "Holy Roller" outfit caused in Oregon. Common sense and religion go well together but it is often difficult to get the mixture of the proper consistency.

In justice to the towns situated along the line of the Southern Pacific, as well as to the traveling public, the railroad company ought to post a time card at the Union depot in Portland where all the overland passengers are unloaded, directing those who may want to come out on this branch to Jefferson street depot. A stranger arriving at the Union depot who may want to come to Newberg is completely at sea unless he has been informed beforehand and in numerous instances passengers have been compelled to lay over a day in the city on account of being unable to locate Jefferson street depot in time to reach the train.

This is the first number of volume nineteen of the Graphic and not a single issue has ever been missed. The city daily has its place to be sure, but who would do without the local paper that tells of the happenings in the home life of the community? The home territory tributary to the Graphic is somewhat limited, situated as we are with the Washington county line only four miles away on the north, the Clackamas county line only a little farther away to the east and Marion county just across the river opposite Newberg on the south, and yet we find, in conversing with other newspaper men, that our subscription list is double that of the average newspaper published outside the county seat towns. It has taken a good many years to build up this list of subscribers but a glance at our advertising columns will show that the business men of Newberg who want to reach the eyes as well as the purses of the people appreciate our efforts. It pays the business man to advertise if he is able to reach the people. That is just what the Graphic does for the business men of Newberg.

While the Graphic scribe stood on Sixth street in Portland last Saturday and looked up at the magnificent twelve story building that is being erected by the Wells Fargo Company, he took note of the fact that the brick that add so much to the appear-

ance of the building were made right here in Newberg, and yet there was nothing in sight to tell the thousands of people who stop every day to look up and admire the beautiful architecture, where the brick came from. The Newberg Pressed Brick Company is certainly making a great mistake in neglecting such an opportunity to advertise to the world what they are doing. The fact that they are unable to fill the orders that come to them does not alter the case. No live business man neglects to advertise his business on account of the good trade he already has. Then again the company owes it to Newberg to let the people know where those brick were made. It is worth something to the town and no time should be lost in having a large sign painted to place on the building while it is in the course of construction, telling where and by what company the brick were manufactured. The same may be said of the many other buildings the company is furnishing material for in the city. Wake up O. K., and show a little more civic pride. A few dollars spent in this way will not be thrown away by any means. You are at the head of an industry that we are all proud of and we want the world to know that it is located at Newberg.

It is really touching to note how solicitous the Portland dispensers of old rye are for the welfare of the people, since the local option law was made effective in Yamhill and several other counties in the state. If they keep up their present rate of sending letters out to the residents of the dry counties the extra sale of stamps will cause another raise in the Portland postmasters salary by the end of the next fiscal year. The latest circular of one of the wholesale dispensers of wet goods starts out by saying:

"Owing to the Local Option law working a hardship on the residents of dry districts and making it practically impossible for those, so desiring to obtain goods in our line for medical or family use, and for entertaining purposes, we have after much solicitation decided to prepare special packages to meet this demand."

How kind it is on the part of this firm, "after much solicitation," to volunteer to throw themselves into the breach and meet the crying needs of those who are suffering for the want of wet goods for "medical or family use." So far as noted here in Yamhill the loss of life on account of the lack of the usual remedy for snake bites has not been above the average, but such forethought and kindly interest as is shown in this letter should not be allowed to pass without notice and a leather medal to be made of mule skin should be ordered at once.
