A Word From Mr. Alderman.

In answer to "A Word of Criticism," by F. A. Elliott in last week's paper permit me to say: Some time before the fair opened I wrote to three county school superintendents, and fully expected them to act as judges of the grand prize. On the second day of the fair as I had not heard from two of them, I began to try to secure other judges. I asked Dr. Withycombe, Mrs. C. A. Waldo, W. C. Hawley, Mr. Brunk and J. H. Ackerman to act as judges. They were all busy and declined to act.

On Friday morning and not before did I speak to the committee who were judging the vegetables to pay special attention to the relative merits of the district displays so that in case the judges did not come I could use their judgement in the matter.

Mr. Robinson, superintendent of schools of Multnomah county, came on Friday morning and gave me his opinion which I accepted as final. As Mr. Robinson was superintendent of the Oregon educational exhibit at the Lewis & Clark exposition I was of the opinion that his judgement would not be questioned in this case although he was to act alone.

Mr. Elliott says that the award was not given until Friday evening. I am not aware that the awards were announced until Monday, as Mrs. Jacob Wortman wanted to present each exhibitor with a diploma and we wished the children to get the diplomas before they found out that they did not win prizes. It was for this reason that the awards were not made before.

Mr. Elliott says that the least that I should have done under the circumstances to clear myself of all suspicion would have been to have consulted with the members of my "self-appointed" general committee. In the first place I was not aware that I was under suspicion of any unworthy act and in the second place but one member of the general committee was present during the last two days of the fair.

I cannot conceive of any reason why I should try to be unfair in this matter or why any one should think me to be unfair. I am of the opinion that the whole trouble arose from some people's not knowing that the printed prize list stated that the piano given by Ed Briedwell & Co., and the globe by the Northwest School Furniture Co., were to be given to the school district making the best and second best displays in proportion to the number of children in the district. There are 50 children in the Webfoot district while in the Newberg district there are 697 children.

I wish to assure Mr. Elliott that I acted in entirely good faith in this matter.
