Stomach Troubles.

"She don't dare to pass along close to a vinegar jug, it makes her deathly sick. The doctors say it is because of an acid stomach." This was said to me by one woman concerning another recently. "She can't even eat fruit."

Why does the odor of vinegar so upset her stomach? Why has she an acid stomach? It surely isn't God's or Nature's plan. Why doesn't the doctor correct the cause of that acid stomach, not give her an alkali? That can't possibly have more than a temporary effect. There is a lesion in the splanchnic area of the spine, irritating nerves that go the mucosa (inner lining) of the stomach, distorting and deranging the nutrition and the proportion of the secretions of the stomach. I am as positive of that, though I have never seen her, as I am that she has a stomach. Stomachs don't get deranged so that they can't digest even the most ordinarily healthy foods without a cause.

The glands that produce the Cl. (chlorin) are too active and when water is taken into the stomach, the chlorin, a natural secretion of the stomach, separates some H. (hydrogen) from that drink of water and takes it to itself, thus forming HCl. (hydrochloric acid) a very strong acid. This is because of the stronger affinity of the Cl. for the H. than the O. (oxygen) of the water for the H. The peptic glands are inactive, or partially so, else enough pepsin, another natural secretion of the stomach, would be secreted to counteract the strong acid condition; pepsin is alkaline in character.

The natural secretions of the

stomach will take care of themselves if nerve force and blood supply is right. Neither can be right as long as that splanchnic lesion exists. The splanchnic area of the spine is from the 6th to the 12th dorsal vertebra.

Any trouble of the stomach, lungs, heart, kidneys, bladder or bowels will make its record on the spine, just as sure as the trouble exists. If lesions between the vertebrae didn't exist before to cause the trouble they will be produced and aggravated, or make it more marked. These lesions or derangements may be slight and yet cause serious physiological trouble. Osteopathy daily proves this.

Derangement of splanchnics will derange the solar plexus or "abdominal brain," too. A slight derangement here may cause widespread results, the solar plexus being the reorganization center for the body, impulses passing out from it to the spinal cord and to the cerebral hemispheres (brain.)

The irritation to the chlorin-secreting glands, in this case, or the lack of normal stimulation to the peptic glands is what deranges her stomach. To artificially supply the alkaline, the pepsin, to this woman's stomach never will strengthen those already weakened glands; it only adds fuel to the fire. To try to "whip up" those glands and make them act, without first normalizing the nerve force, is like "putting the spurs" to a "jaded" horse. And that is just why so many poor stomachs are dosed to death—have recurring attacks after a few weeks or months and have to keep up that continual round of getting well again. Think of the dyspeptics who have taken NaHCO₃ (bicarbonate of soda) and other drugs for years and still they have dyspepsia. This of itself (common baking soda) the effervescence of which in the stomach will finally produce by repeated fermentation, in an aggravated form, the very thing it is taken to cure.

The American Illustrated Dictionary by Dorland says it is good for gout and diabetes too, and that it is anti-rheumatic also. It may be true but I have treated rheumatic patients who were far from well before taking treatment though they had used baking soda for years.

Dr. Sanford T. Lyne, of Leavenworth, Kansas, is an old practitioner and graduate of the A. S. O., whom I desire to quote along this very line: "Stomach digestion being dependent upon certain properties of due proportion in the gastric juice, upon the peristaltic action of the organ which turns the food over and over, it is apparent that interference with any of these nerves controlling the action of the secreting glands or the rythmical movements of the stomach, as well as interference with the blood supply from which the cells select and prepare the necessary elements for the gastric juice, will cause indigestion—a common characteristic of all stomach troubles. While substituting pepsin, acid, phosphates, etc., for the deficiency of their elements in the gastric juice may give temporary relief, it is evident that substitution does not remove the cause of the deficiency.
