

LYCEUM COURSE ASSURED.

First Number to be Given Next Wednesday Night in Duncan's Opera House.

Those having in charge the management of the Newberg Lyceum Course are pleased to announce that a sufficient number of tickets have been sold to warrant them to sign the contract with the Great Western Lyceum Bureau, calling for the splendid attractions as mentioned heretofore in these columns. The people of Newberg and vicinity have manifested an interest in the worthy project which is encouraging and which speaks well for our type of citizenship. To maintain a course furnishing the class of attractions such as will visit Newberg is a good advertisement for a town the size of ours, as evidenced by the following. The Portland manager of the Bureau, who resides at the Hobart-Curtis, was speaking well of Newberg and its people after his first visit here. He remarked that he had sold a fine course of entertainments here, one number of which was the Leonora Jackson Co., a \$250 attraction. One lady present, one of Portland's prominent musicians and club women, was skeptical and refused to be convinced that Newberg could support such a course until assured that the contract had been signed.

The first number will appear promptly, and will be one of the best. On next Wednesday evening, November 14th, The Lulu Tyler Gates Co., will be heard in Duncan's Opera House. Mrs. Gates, who leads the company, is a reader of much more than ordinary ability. The remarkable charm of her personality, the strength and richness of her voice, her enthusiasm as an artist and her high appreciation of the best things in literature, all contribute to insure her unbounded success as a public reader. Other members of the concert company are Miss Edith Adams, the noted violinist who has won fame in Europe as well as in America; Graham Smith, a bass soloist, possessing a particularly sweet and powerful voice; William Erhart Snyder, a pianist who finished his education in the Vienna Imperial Conservatory.

The reserved seat plats for this entertainment will be opened at both drugstores on Monday morning at eight o'clock. Those holding season tickets will present them and secure their reservations. The price for reserved seats for the single number to those not holding a course ticket will be fifty cents. Obviously, no favor can be shown between those holding season tickets and those who do not in the matter of choice of seats, and it will be a case of first come first served.

A word to those who have spoken for course tickets. They are ready for delivery and it is earnestly desired that all who possibly can will call for their tickets to-morrow, Friday, at the office of F. A. Morris, secretary of the Newberg Lyceum Association. It is absolutely necessary that tickets be in the hands of their owners before Monday, when the plats will be opened, and considering the great number of ticket holders it will be almost impossible for the committee to make a personal delivery to all in so short a time.

It may be added that while a sufficient number of tickets have been sold to secure the course, the committee is desirous of selling as many as possible, as any surplus which may accrue will be applied to strengthen the course next year. Tickets may

Lots of Basketball in Sight for Coming Season.

Pacific College was represented by Arthur Wilson at Salem Friday in a meeting of the basketball enthusiasts of the state when the Oregon State Basketball League was organized. The members of the league are the Portland and Salem Y. M. C. A's., Dallas College, Pacific College, Multnomah Club, Willamette University, Monmouth Normal and Pacific University. As every team in the league will play every other team twice during the season, each team will play fourteen games, half of which will be played at home. The season opens December 14th. The schedule of games to be played here, follows:

Pacific College plays at Newberg—Salem Association, December 14; Willamette University, December 21; Monmouth Normal, January 11; Pacific University, January 26; Multnomah, February 16; Dallas College, March 1; Portland Association, March 15.
