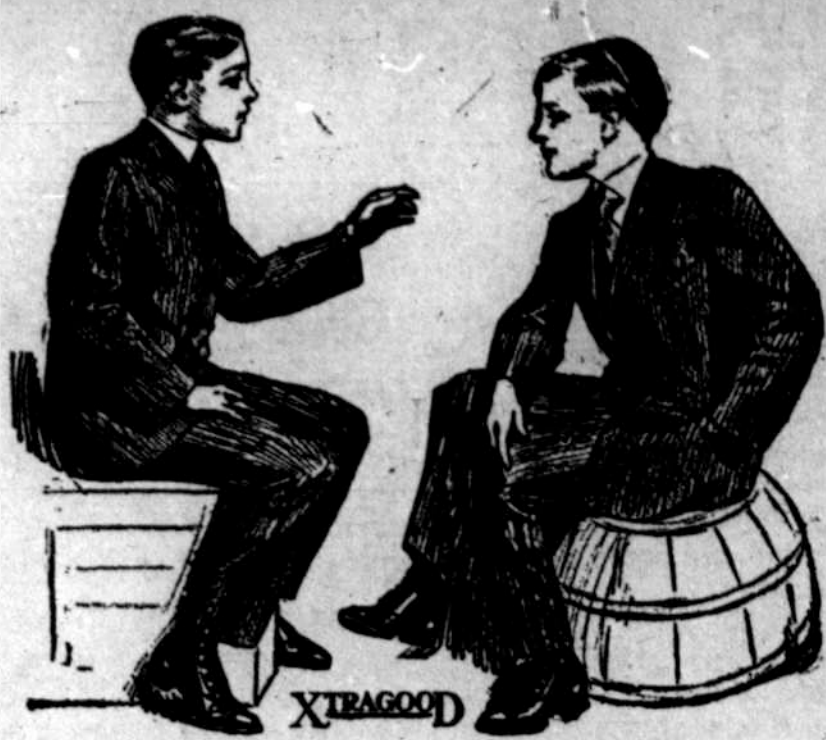

Clinic Patients at the Oregon Osteopathic Meeting.

At the meeting of osteopaths in Portland, October 27th, those present were privileged to see a number of clinic patients whom their friends brought before them for consultation. It was not only an aid to the doctor in charge, but a benefit to the patients as well.

Dr. Arnold, of Vancouver, presented a lady suffering from gallstones. Acute attacks had been frequent. Old school doctors had issued their ultimatum, "an operation." He was called in the 17th and had the lady resting easily in three hours; the first for a week. She and her folks are satisfied with osteopathy. The gallduct and gall bladder were both much enlarged and visible below the ribs.

Dr. Mary Schoette, of Portland, presented a case of potts disease, a boy aged four; it was congenital (from birth). Three months' treatment showed improvement. Indigestion had been overcome and his appetite was again good. She presented another case, boy, age six, with infantile paralysis. There was foot drop and so talipes equines (walking on toes).

A boy, age fifteen, with brachial paralysis (right arm), was Dr. Bowers' clinic. Motion had been entirely lost. Five weeks' treatment showed improvement.

Dr. Otis F. Akin, Portland, presented a case of nocturnal enuresis (bed-wetting) in a girl, age thirteen; a few weeks showed slight improvement.

Dr. C. E. Walker, Portland, a case of atlas lesion, which produced a splitting headache, and an atrophy (wasting away) of tissues of one side of the face. She was ten years old.

Dr. Akin also presented pathological specimens of a fatty heart and pericarditis, and a cirrhotic liver, "hob-nailed liver," or gin-drinker's liver. The healthy liver is a very soft organ, but this one was hard as a rock.
