EASTER IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Another Interesting Letter from Mrs. McKillop.

Lucena, Tayabas, P. I., April 15, 1906.—This is Easter Sunday with you and with us but the way it is observed is vastly different. Here the celebration begins on Thursday and lasts until Sunday. During that time it is impossible to get anything done. No one will work. Beginning very early in the morning on Thursday the people began to go to church to say over their rosaries. They were going and coming all day long. At intervals throughout the day and also on Friday a company of about fifty boys passed through the streets making a horrible noise by shouting, rattling sticks of bamboo, etc. This was to scare the devil out of town. They almost drove the Americans out. At seven o'clock in the evening on Thursday a grand procession passed through the streets. There were nine floats. The leading one was bearing the wax figure of Peter. Just as conspicuous as Peter was a huge white rooster, the one that crew thrice, I suppose. Many natives say that the apostle Peter ran a cock-pit. Another float represented Christ before the scoffers; another, Christ being beaten; another, Christ bearing the cross. There was one representing John and the others were the Virgin. Between 2000 and 3000 people were in the procession which extended for a number of squares. Everyone bore a lighted candle. On the next night the procession was repeated the same as before with the addition of a float. This float was a hearse and the body of Christ, laid out for burial, was plainly shown through the glass sides. The virgin was clad in black. The floats are elaborate affairs owned by private families and some of them costing as much as a thousand pesos. The people go to the church and kiss the feet of the images. All this seems like idolatry to us, but we are told it is the form Catholicism invariably takes among ignorant people. At midnight on Friday the image of Christ was buried. Long before daylight this morning people were crowding the streets. Out of curiosity we went down to view the performance. A high arch had been erected over the street. Another long procession took place and ended with the black robed image of Mary under the arch. A little girl dressed in yellow, blue, green, red and pink, to represent an angel, was lowered from the top of the arch. She unfasted the black robe of Mary and carried it up into the top of the arch. She was lifted and lowered by a rope. The image of Christ was then brought forward, and it and the image of Mary were made to bow to each other several times. Then all went to church again. We asked one of the better class what a certain float meant and he answered, "Although we Filipinos are Christians we do not understand any of these things."
