In November 1903 the Graphic said, "From one end of the Willamette valley to the other one continued wail has gone up this season from the shippers of various valley products on account of a scarcity of cars in which to get those products to market. Gray hairs have been sprouted on account of the anxiety resulting and thousands of dollars have been lost by the failure of the Southern Pacific to meet the needs of its patrons.
