HORTICULTURAL MEETING. Biggest Event of the Kind Ever Held in Oregon.

The state Horticultural Society will meet in Portland, January 8-9-10. Two days for discussion. The morning of the 10th is to be a demonstration of power spraying apparatus.

Three gasoline outfits have expressed a willingness to enter, and one compressed gas outfit will be in service. This demonstration will be a valuable feature of the evening and well worth any orchardist's time.

The fifteen splendid cups to be offered as prizes for the best exhibit of apples, pears, prunes and nuts, will draw a big display of the finest fruit. As most of the cups are given for fruit in commercial packages, the exhibit will be an educational factor of no small moment.

Particulars as to competition and exhibits may be had of the secretary. Entries must be made by 12 m., January 8. Only members of the society may compete for cups or awards but any one may become a member by sending his name and address and one dollar to E. R. Lake, secretary, Corvallis.
