F. H. Dorrance Shot.

Word was received here Wednesday of the fatal shooting, at Laidlaw, of F. H. Dorrance, a former resident of Newberg and brother of David Dorrance, who is in partnership with the David boys in the sawmill business on Chehalis mountain. The deceased came to Newberg in 1891 from Salem with his brothers and erected a mill on the river which was later sold to the Spaulding Logging Co. Wednesday's dispatches from Laidlaw gave the following account of the shooting:

Harrison A. Melvin, a resident of the Laidlaw section, shot and fatally wounded F. H. Dorrance, of the sawmill firm of Dorrance Bros., Sunday afternoon. The bullet passed through Dorrance's body just above the ribs and he died Sunday night at ten o'clock, about nine hours after the shooting. Melvin surrendered at Prineville to-day. The two men had been on bad terms for some time over timber land.
