In the future parties wanting changes made in their advertisements must have their copy in not later than Tuesday evening. An advertisement, set up at the last minute in a rush, is hardly ever satisfactory either to the printer or the merchant.

When we see a woman with six inches of her dress trailing behind her, nothing but our extreme modesty prevents us from calling her attention to the fact that sidewalks and street crossings get awfully nasty at this season of the year in Oregon.

The little city of Medford has a bonded indebtedness of \$75,000 and a judgement of \$5,000 rendered in a damage suit, booked against the municipality. The revenue from licensed saloons and a big brewery combined has failed to keep an even balance in the books of the city treasurer it appears.

In many counties the county fruit inspector is issuing circular letters to farmers and fruit growers giving instructions how to proceed in the war against fruit pests. So far we have failed to see the name of a Yamhill county man appended to any such a statement. If Yamhill county has a fruit inspector the Graphic would be glad to be so informed. Next May or June will not be the time to fight the San Jose scale. Trees should be cleaned up and sprayed at once to be effectual and without injury to the fruit buds.

The Graphic had hoped to be able to make a more definite report regarding the cannery proposition this week but we can only say that after the Portland parties made the offer to Mr. Parker there was considerable delay before the matter was taken up, and in the meantime they concluded that nothing was going to be done, and consequently took up a proposition for an investment elsewhere which has not yet been definitely settled. Not until a conclusion is reached in this matter are they ready to say what they will do toward a cannery investment at Newberg.

Two weeks ago the Dayton Optimist announced the fact that the business men of Dayton were taking steps for the organization of a mutual insurance company, the plan being to carry risks for merchants on plans similar to those adopted by the Oregon Fire Relief Association which confines its risks largely to farm property. Last week the Optimist makes note of the fact that none of the Yamhill county papers made mention of the matter and is inclined to grow cross grained about the seeming slight. The Graphic pleads not guilty of any intent to ignore the important step taken by Dayton. In the holiday rush of work a hasty glance was taken at the Optimist and the paper dropped among a bushel of other exchanges that were never unfolded. When the Oregon Fire Relief Association was organized at McMinnville the publisher of the Graphic was one of the first two hundred property owners to join the association and he is still a member of it. We are glad to see the steps taken by the Dayton people and we assure them that if

they get their association on a good working basis we will be only too glad to join it. The rate we are paying is enormously high and with a carefully managed mutual insurance association a big saving can certainly be made for the members. Just a word more to the Optimist. We have never noticed any disposition on the part of the newspapers of the valley to fall over each other in their haste to boost any proposition fathered by Newberg. We don't expect it. If we did and waited for it we would get left every time. Don't stop to shed tears over the lack of interest on the part of others. If you wait for them to do the shouting for you you will never get very far away from the "mourners bench."

If any personal work is required, along with a cash donation, to rid the community of a "gallon house" we are expected to be on hand. If public interest is to be aroused in an effort to get a manufacturing plant or other industry established in Newberg we are expected to get in and do our best from start to finish and there has been no hesitancy in asking us for cash subscriptions when a bonus has been required to land some of these industries.

The Graphic lays no claim to having done more than its share in these worthy efforts but we think we can see where there is a failure to reciprocate. Every week we mail sample copies of the paper to people who write for information about Newberg and the Willamette valley, and many who have located here say they came on account of the information thus furnished. People of this class who are seeking for information, read every line in the paper, all advertisements included, for a local paper is expected to be an index of the town and community in which it is published.

Of all our real estate men who are watching every train with the hope of catching a buyer of real estate, none of them have even a card in the Graphic. We have several manufacturing plants in Newberg, of which we are justly proud, and of which the Graphic tells its readers from time to time, and none of these, with the single exception of the Chehalem Valley Mills, carry a line of advertising in the Graphic.

Again we will say this is no growl. It is a simple statement of facts. We are giving Newberg just as good a paper as we can afford to with the patronage we are receiving. We would like to give our readers a better paper and we make note of these plain truths, hoping that a few of our people may take about fifteen minutes off the first rainy day that comes and do a little thinking. If on sober thought they shall conclude to adopt a system of reciprocity with the Graphic it will be appreciated and we think they will not be losers thereby.
