BIG SCHOOL MEETING.

Bond to Pay off and 583 Children to Provide for. An Eight and One Half Mill Tax Voted.

For harmony of sentiment and expression, the school meeting of district number 29, held at the big public school building in Newberg on Friday afternoon of last week was all that could be desired.

Immediately after the throng had assembled, C. J. Edwards, chairman of the board, rapped for order, and after the call for the meeting had been read proceeded to explain the situation and the needs for the coming year. Following ten minutes of inquiry and discussion a motion was made, seconded and carried by unanimous vote, fixing the tax levy at eight and a half mills and the work of the meeting was over.

The school enrollment has reached 583, showing a large constituency and since the call was for the purpose of voting a tax for carrying on the school work next year the attendance was no larger than it was reasonable to expect. Three two by six notices had been posted in "conspicuous places" in the district, as the law requires, fixing the date of the meeting and yet one of the large, well lighted recitation rooms, which had been heated for the occasion, was ample to seat the assembled populace. Had the law required the publication of the call in the local papers where people would have seen it, more room would probably have been needed.

As it was a representative of the Graphic made a careful "estimate" of the assembly and he found that aside from two school directors, the clerk, the Principal of the school, the man who hauls the children in from the country and a visiting teacher from outside the district, there were just two people present, a former school director and the Graphic representative.

Since there are several interested parties in the district who were not present at this important meeting, they will no doubt depend on the Graphic to furnish them with information respecting the conditions existing that makes an $8\frac{1}{2}$ mill tax necessary. The main trouble seems to be that Newberg has a large and rapidly increasing number of children to educate. Of course it is the other fellow who has too many children, "we" never have.

The increase in the attendance this year has made it necessary to employ two more teachers than were provided for in last year's estimate, and this deficiency must be made up in the amount to be raised by this year's tax levy. The total number of teachers now employed is fourteen at salaries that amount in the aggregate to \$685 a month. If anyone suggests that the salaries are too high they will be met with the answer that the principal, R. W. Kirk, has been offered about \$20 a month more salary in a Multnomah county school and others are being offered more money in other schools.

The janitor is paid \$47.50 a month; the man who hauls the children in from the country, \$40; the fuel bill is \$275 a year; cost on \$11,000 insurance carried, \$92 a year; interest on school bonds \$742.50.

One room is being used in an unfinished condition. This with another room must be completed before next fall, which will cost about \$500 and some \$400 that was paid out for furniture this year must be provided for. In view of all these things it was figured that on a property valuation of \$718,532.50 in the district a five and a half mill tax was necessary to raise the amount of money needed to carry on the school.

A \$2000 bond becomes due in June and three mills were added to meet this, making a total levy of eight and a half mills.
