William Everest Deceased.

After a lingering illness of more
than a year, William Everest,
one of the few remaining pioneers
of Chehalem valley, died at his
home situated a half mile east of
Newberg on Tuesday night.

The deceased was born August
31, 1836 at Heaner, Kent coun-
ty, England, and in the same
year emigrated with his parents
to the United States, stopping
one year at Newark, Ohio, then
removing to Iowa. In the year
1847 the family crossed the
plains with the big emigration
of that year, arriving in Cheha-
lem valley in December, after
having spent six months on the
road. Land was taken up,
houses built, orchards set and
every preparation made for per-
manent homes, the farm where
Mr. Everest died being a part of
the original donation claim.
Later came the big gold excite-
ment, making a good market for
products of the soil and the de-
ceased often told his friends
about selling apples by the bush-
el basket to a buyer who came
to the orchard, when every time
he carried a basket of apples to
the wagon it meant \$15 to them.

During his younger years Mr.
Everest spent a good deal of
time in the mines of California,
Oregon and Idaho, but the later
years of his life have been spent
at the old home. He was a kind
and obliging neighbor and was
well known to all the earlier
settlers of the valley. On April
26, 1893, he was married to
Josephine Acheson, who with
their two daughters, Margaret
and Maude survive him. Of the
large family who crossed the
plains in 1847, only one brother,
George Everest, who resides at
Igo, California, remains living.

Funeral services will be con-
ducted at the residence Friday
morning at 10:30 by Rev. Lowry.
