If you have any friends who are thinking of coming to Oregon now is the time to write them regarding low passenger rates. Commencing March 1st, and continuing daily until April 30th, tickets will be on sale for any point in Oregon, for \$25 from Kansas City and all other Missouri river points. This also means from St. Paul and Minneapolis, and all the territory west, including the most important agricultural sections of the United States, and from just where we want our home builders.

The owners of the locks at Wilamette Falls demanded of the national Government \$1,200,000 for the sale of the locks in 1899, while the United States engineers placed the actual value of the locks at \$314,300. It now develops that the owners contend that they have exclusive right to use all the water flowing over the falls. There is nothing particularly startling in the announcement of this claim, since the public has learned that these big

corporations have no hesitancy in claiming the earth and the fullness thereof.

The Graphic takes no stock in the published criticism of Paul Rader, superintendent of the anti saloon league, as it has appeared in the papers during the week. Mr. Rader says he is ready to meet his traducers and answer all the charges made, and we believe he will come out on top. It shows lack of judgment on the part of members of the league to rush into print with such accusations, even if there was good grounds for them. Possibly it is the work of disgruntled members who are willing to shy a few stones at Rader, on account of not being allowed to have their way about things.

This community did not get even a touch of the heavy sleet that prevailed in Multnomah county last Monday. There was enough on Chehalem and Parrott mountains to cause limbs of trees to break, but in and around Portland the damage to fruit and ornamental trees, to say nothing of the damage to trolley and telephone wires was heavy. Several horses were killed by live wires and some persons were injured but no human lives were lost. People who saw it say it was a very beautiful sight to see the wires and trees loaded down with icicles, but the danger from broken wires was so apparent that it will have the effect of causing an underground system to be inaugurated in Portland at an early day.
