Home Remedies.

Cure for Neuralgia—A simple remedy for neuralgia is, to apply grated horseradish prepared the same as for table use, to the temple when the face or head is affected, or to the waist when the pain is in the arm or shoulder.

Flowers in a Sick Room—Flowers are always pleasing to the eye, but do not introduce those of strong scents into an invalid's room, and be careful to remove all cut flowers at night, as they absorb the air and leave it less fresh for the patient.

Poultice for Chilblains—An excellent poultice for chilblains is made by scraping the pulp out of a baked white turnip and mixing it with a tablespoonful of salad oil, one of mustard and one of grated horseradish. Place the mixture on a soft rag and apply.

Barache—In case of earache do not put anything into the ear except by direction of a physician. The best way to relieve earache is to heat an iron or a brick, wrap it in two or three thicknesses of flannel, pour warm water on the top, when the steam will at once rise. If the ear is placed close to the flannel the steam will permeate every part of it.

Useful Thirst Quenchers—To assuage thirst and cure feverishness, apple tea is a notable sick drink. It is made by slicing up raw apples into a jug, filling up the jug with boiling water, as in tea making, then sweetening to taste. When cold, this apple tea will be found pleasingly tart and refreshing.

For Hoarseness—If you are hoarse, lemon juice squeezed onto soft sugar till it is like syrup, and a few drops of glycerine added, relieves the hoarseness at once.

To Treat Bruises—To prevent a bruise from being discolored, apply to it a cloth which has been wrung out of water as hot as can be borne comfortably and change it as it becomes cold. Supposing hot water cannot be procured, the next best thing is to moisten some dry starch with cold water and cover the bruised part with it.

That Tired Feeling—If you are over tired—"too tired to sleep," as we sometimes say—bathe the neck and temples with hot water. Bathe the back of the neck particularly. This seems to relax the muscles and the veins that supply the brain with blood. Lie down to sleep with peace, for it will come surely. The same treatment will wonderfully refresh during the day. A headache may often be relieved, even cured, by hot applications to the back of the neck.
