President Roosevelt and the San Francisco School Board have reached an agreement over the Japanese matter, and the yellow journals may as well put away their pop guns.

Word comes from Washington that Senator Mulkey is considered to be one of the handsomest members in the Senate. They will remember him when he goes back the next time for a longer term.

Editor McManus, of Pilot Rock, went to Pendleton last Saturday, loaded up with booze and shot a man dead. All this happened in Umatilla county where the Helix Herald says they don't have disgraceful rows caused by drink, as they do in local option counties.

The legislature has finally passed a railroad commission bill placing the appointing power with the state board instead of with the governor. It is indicated that the governor will name one member of the commission, Secretary of State Benson one and Treasurer Steel the other.

Professor Thomas Condon, the famous Oregon geologist, whose home was at Eugene, died last Monday at the age of eighty-five years. He was a native of Ireland, but came to America when eleven years of age and in 1862 came to Oregon from New York. He was an unquestioned authority on geology of the Pacific Northwest, having written "The Two Islands," "Geological History of Oregon" and a number of university bulletins.

Soon after the local option law was enacted and put into force, it was announced with a great flourish of trumpets that certain towns in counties that had been voted dry, would annul the law by adopting new charters allowing saloon licenses to be granted. Several towns made the attempt and a test case in Coos county was carried up to the supreme court. As will be seen in a news note from Salem, a decision has been rendered which knocks out the contention of the saloon men. This is one of the most decisive victories that has been scored for the local option law and all friends of the law will rejoice over the decision.

A trolley line from Portland to Mount Hood which is in the embryo stage and which, will, sooner or later be built, will be an attraction for tourists and will no doubt be a paying investment. The trip to Mount Lowe is one of the drawing cards for Los Angeles and Pasadena. Californians know how to take advantage of every such opportunity to arrange for the pleasure and entertainment of tourists and at the same time extract the dollars from their pockets. Portland has much to show her visitors already, but a trolley line to Mount Hood would be worth much in the way of advertising the city as a resort for tourists.

A legislative committee has recommended an appropriation of \$2500 for the purchase of ten acres of land surrounding the monument located on the bank of the river at Champoege. This historic spot where the first steps

were taken toward the establishment of a provisional government for Oregon ought to be improved, but Hofer and Zorn, the owners of the land, ought not to be allowed to hold up the state for three times the actual value of the land.

Business is dull in Tillamook when the newspapers of that city are clear of a libel suit. The latest announcement is as follows: "Sim Earl filed a libel suit in the circuit court today against Fred C. Baker, editor of the Tillamook Headlight, who wants \$5000 damages, claiming that his reputation has been injured to that extent. The Headlight published a list of cases, and gave the names of the jurors in each case, giving as well the jurors who were for conviction and those who were for acquittal, in a number of local option cases tried recently in this city, but in the 'Jesse Earl case' it made a mistake in saying the 'Sim Earl case.' For this Sim Earl wants the above amount."

The big expositions come high but we have got to have them. When the Lewis and Clark Fair was first talked of, much fear was expressed lest it bankrupt Oregon, but this fair was really the means of infusing new life into business and starting the state on the road to greater prosperity than we have ever before known. The Seattle fair in 1909 promises to be a hummer and now comes the announcement that California will celebrate the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the Pacific Ocean in 1913 with a big fair to be held at San Francisco. We will all be called on to pay tribute to these fairs in the way of taxes to enable Oregon to make creditable exhibits, but the returns to the state will be four fold.

Mail Agent Piper calls our attention to a fact in regard to the naming of farms that may cause slow service in regard to the delivery of mail. It is the giving of farms the same name as post-offices. Those who adopt a name for their farm should try and make it as distinctive as possible and be particularly careful that it does not conflict with some already established post-office. The same or a similarity of names causes the postal clerks more bother than any one thing in the service. As they are generally compelled to work at race horse speed in the distribution of mail on the cars, a glance is all that can be given. If your farm name should be given the prominence on a letter, it may be sent to a town of that name in another state. In addressing an envelope, the town and state are the things to give prominence, the name of the person coming secondary for the local postmasters' consideration. Itemizer.

### Studying Nut Culture at O. A. C.

A. C. Goodrich, fruit inspector for Yamhill county, is at the O. A. C. studying all about fruit trees, and how to kill the pests. He is also making a study of nut trees, as there is a great demand for information on this subject all over Yamhill county. Thomas Prince, of Dundee, sold his walnut crop this year for sixteen cents per pound, which is about three cents more than was paid for California nuts. Mr. Prince was offered \$650 per acre for his forty acre walnut orchard. Large and small orchards are being put out all over Yamhill county, and it will be but a few years until walnuts and filbert nuts will be one of the main crops of old Yamhill.—Albany Herald.
