Governor Chamberlain has appointed Attorney E. V. Littlefield, of Moro, brother of Dr. Harry Littlefield, of Newberg, judge for the new judicial district recently created by the legislature and comprising Sherman, Wheeler and Crook counties.

Hon. C. V. Galloway, of McMinnville, has been appointed State Land Agent, by the Governor, to take the place made vacant by the appointment of Oswald West as one of the railroad commissioners. Thanks to the Governor for honoring a Yamhill county man and we assure him Charley will make good.

After the defeat of the Newell bill for the suppression of pool selling on the state fair grounds, he introduced another bill for the suppression of gambling of all kinds in the state, which passed the House and we are glad to note that Representative Crawford voted for the bill. What the Senate will do with the bill remains to be seen.

Under present conditions, when wages for labor of all kinds is at the top notch and it is difficult to find men to supply the demand for work, it is an opportune time to take advantage of conditions and lay by each week a part of the wages, in anticipation of the lean years that are sure to follow, if history repeats itself, and we know it does.

After a full investigation was made of the charges preferred against Paul Rader, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, he was fully exonerated, not a single one of the charges being substantiated. This must be disappointing to a handful of the "brethren" who started in on the rule or ruin policy, as well as to the Oregonian which seemed determined to, if possible, blacken the reputation of Mr. Rader.

The three railroad commissioners recently appointed by the state board are Oswald West, now State Land Agent; Clyde B. Atchison, a Portland attorney and Thomas K. Campbell, a lumberman of Cottage Grove. It looks like good judgement had been used in making the selection. It is now up to these men to make good for the people and at the same time give the railroads fair treatment. This is all that either side should ask or expect.

The Graphic acknowledges the receipt of a copy of the ninth biennial report of the State Board of Horticulture, which contains three hundred and fifty pages, is well illustrated by pictures of individual fruit trees and well kept orchards located at different points throughout the state, and is full of practical hints for the horticulturist. Diseases of fruit trees are treated and remedies that have been tested are given. A copy of the report ought to be in the hands of every man in the state who has an orchard. A request mailed to H. M. Williamson, the

secretary at Portland will no doubt bring you a copy.

Profane language in a store drives away women customers. There are few grocers in Oregon who swear—before folks—or allow their clerks to do so, but they do not always insist that the men in the stores observe the same rules. Vulgar language is, if anything, even more repulsive to the ladies. The moral atmosphere should be as clean as the shining fixtures themselves. This is business sense—not preaching.—Oregon Tradesman.

We heartily commend this to every business man as well as the merchant. Not alone is the vulgar and profane speech disgusting to the ladies, but the best men of the land today have but contempt for those who continually practice this habit. And many would refrain from entering such places of business oftentimes if the general trend of circumstances did not really make it obligatory. And this, too, is sense—not preaching.—Hood River News-Letter.

Still it is a better sermon than some we have heard from the pulpit.

The bit of sarcasm taken from the Hood River News-Letter and given below, was probably intended for Senator Whealdon, who is "off color" with the Hood River people on account of his alleged bad faith in the county division fight. "If you have a little, bob-tailed, yellow cur, and feed him well, give him a brass collar, treat him generously, he will never go back on you, but will fight for you and be faithful under all circumstances. Some men we know, however, are more contemptible than even a little bob-tailed, yellow cur; because with even better treatment, they will turn against you, snarl at your friends, and fight against your interests. In preference give us the little, bob-tailed, yellow cur instead of the man who has not the least sense of gratitude for honors bestowed, or sense of honor in his methods of public service."

A Short time ago the Graphic stated that the little town of Milwaukie, located on the banks of the Willamette a few miles above Portland, was doing all it could to keep decent people from settling there, by the licensing of a gamblers' den where the baser element congregate. The Clackamas county papers have had little to say about it in the past, but last week the Oregon City Courier said: "The lid is off at Milwaukie. Whether the lid is on or off makes little difference to the world at large, but to the people of Clackamas county the existence of a spot within its confines where the gamblers who are driven out of Portland may congregate and hold their revels is a matter of some interest. The people of Milwaukie have been greatly criticised for their action in allowing a gambling club to be operated in their midst. The sentiment of the better class of people in the county is against making Clackamas county the refuge of those for whom other places have no use."

Million Dollar Depot.

To anyone who has watched with any degree of interest the building of interurban electric lines in Oregon, and especially to anyone who has seen the big Union Station of the Huntington system at Los Angeles, the news that Portland is to have a big Union Station for interurban lines will be gladly received. A block located in the heart of the city and bounded by First, Second, Pine and Ash streets has been purchased and plans are being drawn for a building to be constructed of brick and steel, five or six stories high and to cover the entire block. The estimated cost is \$1,000,000. Other expenditures of the company recently announced are \$750,000 for a second power plant on the Clackamas and \$500,000 for new cars. Tracks will run through the station on the ground floor, and interurban cars will loop through the structure. The depot will be

a union one where all interurban trolley lines may have terminal facilities. Waiting rooms, passenger platforms, union ticket office and other conveniences for the public will largely occupy the ground floor.

The building will be the headquarters for the company and office rooms will be rented to others. The location is central and when a stranger arrives in the city he will soon be able to get his bearings from this station. Such is the case in Los Angeles. The Huntington building as it is known is practically the starting point for all tourists who are in the city.

This all looks good to people who are anxiously waiting for the day when the interurban lines shall branch out in every direction from Portland. With the large amount of eastern capital that is being invested in the scheme in Portland, it is evident that we shall not have to wait long.
