County School Superintendent Alderman says the school laws passed by the legislature will not be in force until May 25.

The grand total of the money appropriated by the legislature will amount to more than five dollars for every man, woman and child in the state.

The venerable George T. Angell says in Our Dumb Animals. "Feed the birds in winter. We feed them every day." Our lamented legislature said shoot them on the spot.

A. C. Goodrich, county fruit inspector, has issued a call for a fruit growers meeting in Newberg on Saturday at 1.30 in the afternoon. A good program has been promised and there ought to be a large attendance.

If you want to learn more about successful fruit growing attend the public meeting to be held in Newberg Saturday afternoon. If you know all about it already, attend the meeting and tell others what you know.

The time was when a candidate must get next to the politicians in order to stand a show for a nomination. Just now the politicians are getting awfully scared from the fact that Governor Hughes, of New York, is getting so close to the people that they may demand his nomination for president.

Last year those who backed the Lyceum course ran behind, but this season enough money was taken in to meet all expenses and pay up the deficiency of last year. This makes a clean slate and next season we will no doubt be in a position to contract for the best talent that is offered.

Everybody knows that the saving made to fruit growers by the birds in destroying insects that prey upon the trees as well as the fruit, balances up in a fourfold ratio against the loss sustained in fruit eaten by the birds, and yet there were enough men found in the legislature to make a majority who voted for the repeal of the law protecting the birds. Thanks to Governor Chamberlain who vetoed the bill.

The people demanded that the number of Normal schools fostered by the state be reduced to at least two, and yet the legislature not only failed to carry out the wishes of the people in this matter but they made larger appropriations for all of the four schools than has ever been done in the past. Voters will do well to file away a record of the vote on this question in order to be able to refresh their memories when the next election time comes around again.

It seems that Senator Caldwell saw his way clear to vote for the bill allowing the destruction of songbirds that eat an occasional cherry, and also against the Newell bill for the suppression of pool selling and other forms of gambling. Here about the home of the senator we raise enough cherries to spare a few for our friends the feathered songsters, and we believe the majority of the people would favor an attempt to worry along without the seller of pools at horse races. In his vote on these two bills we think the senator failed to voice the sentiments of any very large proportion of his constituents. Possibly we may be mistaken.

It is no uncommon thing to see women and girls at the store or postoffice with coin tied up in the corner of a dainty white handkerchief, unmindful of the fact that this same piece of money has probably quite recently been carried in the pocket of the filthiest Dago in the country. Tender babies are also given pieces of money for playthings by unthinking mothers, when if there is any truth in the theory of disease germs being carried about from person to person, probably no other way could be suggested that would more surely subject the little ones to the chances for "catching" the worst forms of disease that are going the rounds. Sleeping Outdoors.

Many persons, with the best will in the world to live in obedience to the laws of health, make a failure of the open-air night, of which one now hears so much, and which is, in fact, the chief dependence in the treatment of tuberculosis.

There are several reasons why the attempt to sleep outdoors, whether literally or in a wide open room, results in failure. It is such a radical departure with so many persons that they do not have the first idea how to start it. A great many of them have at the back of their minds a sort of lingering impression that discomfort is a part of the treatment; that to become hardened one must be wretched, and that misery and virtue are boon companions. As comfort is not expected, there are no plans made to capture it. The would-be disciple of health simply throws up all the windows, gets into bed with the usual coverings, perhaps lies all night with the uncovered head in a direct draft of air, shivers in semiwakefulness for hours, and then, on rising in the morning chilled and devitalized, perhaps coughing and sneezing, condemns the whole scheme as a snare, returns the next night to the closed window plan, and launches himself upon society as the prophet of stuffiness.

This is all wrong, and a little thought will show why. If the night air is to be breathed as it comes straight from outside, as it should be, preparations must be made to welcome it, and a room in which the temperature is twenty degrees or thirty degrees Fahrenheit cannot be occupied in the same clothing as one kept at sixty degrees.

Down coverlets are invaluable for these cold, fresh air nights, for they are as light as they are warm. Many persons are averse to heavy bedclothing, and they are right. Weight does not necessarily imply warmth, and it is foolish to use up vital force in holding up heavy weights during the hours consecrated to rest.

The sleeping garment itself should be of some light and warm material, preferably woolen. Special thought should be given to the protection of the head. People, at any rate in this part of the world, are not accustomed to going bareheaded in the open air, so there is really no reason why they should expect to do so with impunity for seven or eight hours in cold weather at night. A soft cap, cut to cover the ears and to hang down the back of the neck, should always be worn. This shape closes the little space between the cap and the bedclothes, and incidentally prevents many a stiff neck.

A hot-water bottle is a good friend on a bitter night, and is worth more than many top spreads, for the bottle generates heat while the spread only retains it.—Youths' Companion.

Obituary.
