Since E. B. Piper, managing editor of the Oregonian, was one of the judges on papers, in the recent oratorical contest, his comments made in Sunday's Oregonian on Miss Romig's oration, which will be found in this issue of the Graphic, are worthy of notice.

Since the low passenger rates were made effective the first of the month, homeseekers are reported to be pouring into Oregon at the rate of a thousand a day. The present population of our state is very meager, when the area and our varied resources are considered. Consequently we have something good to offer to all that are coming.

Just a word to the real estate men of Oregon. Give the homeseeker the glad hand and show him what you have for sale. But for the sake of the good name of Oregon, don't assume the roll of the detestable knocker if you fail to make a sale, and he falls into the hands of your competitor. This grouchy attitude, which seems to have an abnormal growth among real estate dealers, only tends to bring the business into disrepute and to disgust the homeseeker as well, and it is little wonder that so many people fight shy of the real estate office.

Pacific College is a small institution without endowment, and so far has been wholly dependent on the amount received from tuition and donations made by loyal, self-sacrificing friends for support. The buildings are plain and the members of the faculty but poorly paid, when comparison is made with the salaries paid by other colleges, and yet in the matter of actual results in fitting students for doing things, Pacific College has a good record. Witness the fact that in fourteen oratorical contests, with seven other institutions competing, three of which draw heavily each year from the state treasury, besides having several hundred students to draw from in the selection of orators, Pacific College has received four medals, this being a larger number than is held by any other college in the league.

WHY THE YOUNG WOMAN WON.

A young woman freshman won the state intercollegiate oratorical contest at McMinnville. There were seven contestants, all being young men but the winner. There will be, it may be supposed, a disposition among critical-minded persons to investigate the reasons why one trail and inexperienced young girl student should so easily have vanquished a half dozen male competitors, some of them seasoned debaters and experienced writers. There was, the Oregonian thinks, no question of sex involved. It happened that Miss Romig chose an interesting and sympathetic theme for her essay, and developed it with intelligence and simplicity. The others for the most part, chose topics that were trite and commonplace, and undertook to do and to say too much.

The Oregonian cannot speak of the merits of the platform contest at McMinnville, but it has examined the various composi-

tions, and it is prepared to say that Miss Romig's was undoubtedly the best. It has, therefore, just a simple suggestion to make to all college orators and writers for future contests. Let them avoid abstract topics; and take up a living, definite, specific theme, study it thoroughly and master it fully. Then they may do as well as Miss Romig did. She wrote about child labor. She wrote as if she knew all about it, and because she knew, she had ease, lucidity and facility of expression. Her essays had meaning and purpose and deep human interest. She won. She should have won. Yet others can do as well, if they go about it right, as she did.—Oregonian.
