It is probably a case where the church officials are endeavoring to furnish entertainment for all classes among the membership.

Ezra Meeker, the old pioneer who made the trip overland last year from Portland to Indianapolis with an ox team, going by way of the old emigrant road and marking it at various points along the way by the erection of monuments, spent the winter in Indianapolis and the report now comes that he is arranging to make a similar journey to Washington this season and to go on to the Jamestown exposition. When he arrives in Washington it is safe to say the President will not only give him the glad hand, but he will give him camping privileges in the "back yard" for he has a warm spot in his heart for the plainsman.

When the county seat was removed from LaFayette to McMinnville, some years ago, the old courthouse was turned over to the Evangelical church to be used for a college building, and it was so used up to the time of the removal of the college to Dallas, when the building was disposed of to private parties. It is now claimed that the ground on which the building stands was deeded with the provision

that it was to hold good only while it should be used for county purposes, the land and the building being donated almost entirely by the citizens of La Fayette, and it is stated that the town council will institute legal proceedings to recover the property. The old building is only a relic of bygone days in the history of the county and state, and is scarcely worth the cost of a suit, but since there is a third party to be considered it probably cannot be avoided. "To the victor belongs the spoils" while it is up to the tax payers to pungle up for the costs.

The Granges are taking steps to invoke the referendum in the matter of the appropriation made by the legislature for an expenditure of \$100,000 for armories. VERY GRATIFYING.

It is gratifying to note that in nearly all the colleges in Oregon the students are maintaining debating teams. There is no part of college life that gives better opportunity for development along lines that will bring results for the active duties, as well as the privileges of the true American citizen, and the student who fails to line up and take an active part in these debates is sure to rue his course in after life. The very fact that it requires much hard study and a wide range of reading in the study of both sides of a question, in order to successfully engage in debate with fellow students is good evidence that the drill is a good one.

Take the average audience of two hundred people today and in nearly every instance you can count on the fingers of one hand the men who can stand up and speak with any degree of ease, on questions that come up for discussion, while it is likely that a very large number of those present may have intelligent views that they would like to express, but they shrink from it simply because they have never had the drill when young that is necessary to make public speaking easy. In college life the opportunity is afforded for this sort of drill and no student can afford to drift along and fail to take advantage of it.

Really the proper place to begin it is in the public schools, and we are glad to note that here in Newberg, our public school teachers are taking up this very necessary branch of education and getting the pupils interested in it. With an interest thus awakened for debate among the boys and girls it naturally follows that a little later on there will be more debaters among the college students, and

with mature years the ready speakers in public meetings, when important matters come up for discussion, will be largely increased.

To be a clear thinker with the ability to express one's thoughts in a fluent, concise manner, is an accomplishment that is well worth striving for, and in the springtime of youth is the time for laying the foundation.
