



Newberg Pressed Brick Co. Re-organized and Name Changed.

As a culmination of the plans which the stockholders of the Newberg Pressed Brick Company have had in contemplation for some time, a reorganization was effected in Portland the first of the week. A new company was formed with a capitalization of \$150,000, the articles of incorporation being signed by Jesse Edwards, Andrew Kershaw and C. E. Fuller.

The name of the new corporation is "The Pacific Face Brick Company." Some ten new men are stockholders in the new company, among them being A. J. Bingham of Portland, one of the leading contractors of the Northwest; Andrew Kershaw, Indian agent at Grand Ronde, and C. E. Fuller, son-in-law of Dr. Romig, who is employed with the Title Trust and Guarantee Company in Portland. The election of officers took place in the city Tuesday, resulting as follows: Jesse Edwards, president; Andrew Kershaw, vice president; C. E. Fuller, secretary and O. K. Edwards, treasurer.

The Pacific Face Brick Company will operate largely along lines heretofore followed by the old company but on a considerably larger scale. It is the intention to maintain the Newberg plant as it is, with possibly some increase in capacity, only those clays being worked up in the local plant which are found here.

To obviate the necessity of shipping clay the new company expects to erect a large plant at its Willamina clay banks in the west end of the county. Before this is done however a piece of railroad will have to be built from Sheridan to Willamina, in which enterprise the company will take the initiative. As soon as the necessary rights of way are secured it is expected that active preparations looking toward the improvement will be begun.

Of course Newberg is growing, we all realize that, but it is well to be able occasionally to back up claims with figures. The Graphic herewith presents a few for consideration, given by Station Agent James, who by the way, keeps pretty careful tab on the Southern Pacific business at this point as it indicates the industrial pulse of the community.

It is well understood that the amount of shipping business done by a town is a pretty sure gauge of its size, growth, prosperity, etc. There is no sentiment nor wild claims mixed up with it. It's down in black and white in cold figures and speaks for itself. The books at the station office show that in March 1907 the business in local tickets amounted to \$499.50 more than in the corresponding month of last year and that the foreign ticket sale was greater by \$417.45. There was a greater amount of local freight received by 568,680 pounds, making an increase of business of \$427.82. But what is more important, the amount of freight shipped from Newberg was greater by 1,539,730 pounds. In other words the freight business from Newberg was greater this last March than in the same month of the preceding year by \$4044.23.

What is your guess as to the amount of ticket sales between here and Portland? Mr. James has been in charge at this office fifteen months, during which

time he has sold 4422 straight tickets to the metropolis, 2483 Saturday tickets and 4215 regular round trip tickets. As the last two call for a return ticket, that means an additional 6898 to be counted in. This makes a grand total of 18018 tickets between here and Portland, and for a good share of this time Newberg had but one daily train to the city.

The handling of the business at this point is no sinecure and there is no such thing as an eight hour day for Mr. James and his assistant. However the work is managed in a way highly satisfactory to the public and this fact no doubt has no small relation to the encouraging "balance of trade" which the books of the Newberg office show.

A New Church for Newberg.

On Tuesday night at Crater's Hall a Christian church of thirty-four members was organized with a full corps of officers. This is the result of the seventeen days revival work conducted by evangelists Geo. C. Ritchey and Arthur F. Ritchey. The revival will continue and the charter membership list will be kept open until the close of the series of meetings.

The music, under the direction of Mr. A. F. Ritchey is delighting all who hear it, especially his solos. The new officers are: Elder, W. F. West; deacons, W. B. Sims, Wm. Parrish and Prof. Buchanan; clerk, Mrs. Buchanan; trustees, Mrs. S. A. Deskins, Prof. Buchanan and W. F. West. A large audience was present and remained deeply interested to the close of the service which was near ten o'clock. The public is invited to all services.
