Oregon and Osteopathy.

Did the last legislature pass a law favorable to osteopathy? Or did the state make it illegal for osteopaths to practice in the future? These are queries that we have often been asked to answer lately.

Yes, there was a favorable law passed, which received Gov. Chamberlain's signature, February 26, 1907. We get one representative on the State Board of Health. So after May 25, 1907, the Board of Health will be composed of three allopaths, one homeopath, one eclectic and one osteopath. Formerly there were only five members.

Simple justice was all we asked. There were a few members of the legislature that tried to prevent that, but they met with failure. Full justice would have given us an independent board—a separate board of osteopaths—but as it is we have representation. Osteopathy now has recognition—yes, even by the M. Ds. of the state. We knew when we came to the state—to Newberg—two and a half years ago, that Oregon would show intelligence and advancement along with other states

and give our science complete recognition, and regulate our practice by specific law, else we would have made no preparations for permanent residence here.

Osteopathy cannot be taught outside of an osteopathic college. It now requires nine months attendance in three separate years (twenty-seven months); formerly two years, or twenty months (four terms of five months each.) There is a penalty for violating this statute, so it wouldn't be a bad plan for a man to know what he is talking about, or doing, before "pretending" to practice osteopathy. It is the so-called "dangerous osteopathy" that is practiced by fakirs. It isn't wise to try to practice without a diploma showing proficiency in the science. I have heard of people who said medical colleges teach osteopathy; if so I presume the M. Ds. who have learned it there, can produce their diploma from a recognized osteopathic college, and will have it registered, file it and get their license; if not, it might be well to "have a care." The statute requires us to have a license, showing the approval of the Board of Health.

These two cardinal rules should govern every hired hand: Work for others with the same zeal that I would work for myself; take as much care of their tools as I would of my own.
