THE BUSINESSLIKE WAY.

A prominent authority on advertising says that many a local editor by his attitude in approaching merchants encourages them to treat him more as an object of charity than as a fellow business man. Unfortunately, this statement is true, but the publisher who conducts his affairs in a dignified, business-like way, treats his customers with the courtesy due from one business man to another, and devotes his attention to making his paper all that a local paper should be, need never fear the competition of the man who goes out and begs for business. The average merchant is quick to discriminate between the paper that is winning on its merits and the paper that is existing by the charity graft alone. The merchant who carries good goods and sells them at right prices never finds it necessary to peddle them from house to house, or to appeal to people to buy them on the ground that he needs the money. Neither does the publisher who has something really worth selling ever find it necessary to beg for business or hawk his wares on the street. In the printing business, as in all other lines of legitimate business, merit alone will win—Polk County Observer.

These words are strictly to the point and leave little to be said. They are worthy a second reading in fact. Any publisher or printer could get a good deal of work that either isn't done or that the beggar printer gets, but by refusing to stoop to the dogging method he holds the respect of his fellow business men, and, what is more, maintains his own self-respect.

This is the way the Grants Pass Courier puts it up to some of the residents of that place who see better things elsewhere than at home: "Just over the hill the grass is greener, the sun shines brighter, the crops are larger, there is more money in circulation and everybody is much happier than right here at home. We can find people in Grants Pass who think that the only hope of making any money on a real estate investment is to buy a lot in Portland or on Coos bay or somewhere else. They despise their own back yard and go wandering off to distant scenes; but the opportunities are right here. Climate, varied resources, everything that goes to make up a prosperous community. You have merely to stoop to pick up your diamond." And the name Newberg, or that of any other live town in the state can well be substituted in the above. And it should be. The town which goes to the front is the one in which its citizens believe thoroughly and give practical proof of their belief.

McMinnville College is hustling for a big endowment and the business men of the county seat have taken it upon themselves to raise \$10,000 of the desired amount from among their own number. This speaks well for them, but they could hardly do anything else, viewed from a cold business standpoint if from no other. Such institutions bring into a town far more in dollars and cents than they get in return. McMinnville business men are beginning to realize the fact. A similar effort is being made here for Pacific College. Will Newberg business men do as well? The Graphic thinks they will.

About the meanest man we can imagine is the fellow who goes around and tells his neighbor how badly he got skinned in a sale or trade—and there are several of him. What sense is there in trying to make a man

sick over what is past and can't be helped? Offer your advice beforehand if you must butt in but don't go nosing around after the deal is closed.
